SEES PACIFIC THEATRE OF WORLD'S NEXT WAR

LONDON, Ont., Dec. 1. — The Pacific is "the ocean of to-morrow," and will probably be the main theatre of the next great war, General J. H. MacBrien, chief of staff of the Canadian department of national defense, declared in addressing the Canadian club here. He demanded more adequate defenses on the Pacific coast, declaring that the nation's present naval base, while not obsolete, was obsolete.

Gen. MacBrien stated that the United States has spent \$22,000,000 on the defence of the Panama canal, and that another \$68,000,000 is to be spent on that subject. He declared that "during his sojourn as an observer in Japan he had learned to like the Japanese very much, and that he believes the Japs are right in their claim to a sort of Monroe Doctrine over the Far East."

Islands Ready To Contribute Share

LONDON, Dec. 1. — With reference to the British Government's request for contributions to the Imperial funds from the Channel Islands, Guernsey reaffirms its decision not to contribute to the Imperial exchequer the amount suggested, £275,000. But it is understood that Guernsey's previous offer of a lump sum of £220,000 remains open. It is noteworthy that the Guernsey budget for this year has revealed an unexpectedly heavy deficit. The authorities of the island foresaw additional imposts including an increase in the income tax to a shilling in the pound. Jersey's decision in the matter of the proposed contribution to the Imperial exchequer has not been officially given yet, but it is believed that Jersey's attitude is similar to that of Guernsey—that is, that Jersey's view of the taxable capacity of the island widely differs from the view taken by the British Treasury. A special committee of the Privy Council, headed by the Duke of Atholl, has been investigating the question of the Channel Islands' contribution to the Imperial exchequer but so far the results of the committee's investigation have not been made public.

Labor Committing Tactical Blunder

LONDON, Dec. 1. — The Daily Mail says the decision of the Labor party in Parliament to move a resolution of censure of the Government for having instituted the prosecution of the Communist Party into considered a tactical blunder, into which the Labor leaders must have been forced by the extremist wing of the party. It is regarded as a curious sequel to the recent Labor party conference at Liverpool, where nothing was too bad for the Labor leaders to say of Communism and what it stands for. The Mail says: "The paper adds that the view generally held that the Socialist leaders who identify themselves with an unbridled expression of Communist sentiment are receiving money from Moscow to support their seditious campaign." The motion of censuring the Government, which was placed on the order paper of the House of Commons just after the conviction and sentence of the twelve Communists, is sponsored by Ramsay MacDonald, J. H. Thomas, Philip Snowden, Arthur Henderson and others. It says that "the action of the Government in instituting prosecution against certain members of the Communist party is in violation of traditional British rights of freedom of speech and publication of opinion." The motion is to come up for debate in the House next Tuesday.

LONDON'S LADY MAYOR DIES AFTER SERVICE AT ST. PAUL'S

LONDON, Dec. 2. — Three tragic deaths have occurred in connection with the passing of Queen Alexandra. Saturday evening the lady mayor's wife of Sir William Pryke, lord mayor of London, died suddenly from heart disease after she had attended a memorial service in St. Paul's cathedral. Westlake, custodian of Westminster Abbey, who had overtaxed himself in arranging for the funeral of Alexandra, went home ill, "I am afraid it has been too much for me," his wife heard him murmur as she sat at the bedside. Immediately afterward the canon died. At Sunderland on Wednesday the warden of a church was killed as he was muffling the bells for tolling during yesterday's service in Westminster. A large bell which had been tilted fell over and pinned him to the floor of the belfry, crushing his head and body.

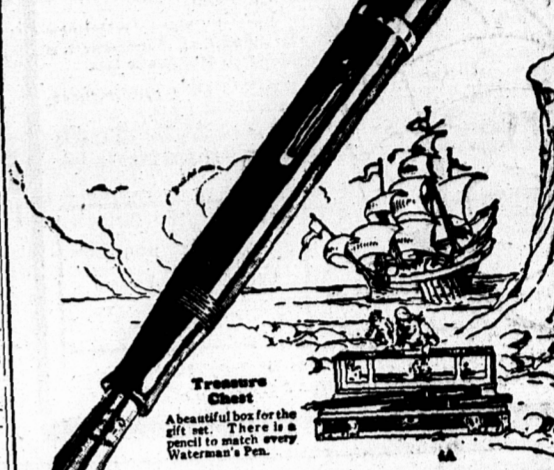
