Omer Alfred Gastonguay which occurred on April 24th in the Halifax Infirmary after a long illness. Mr. Gastonguay was a frequent visitor to the Island and will be kindly remembered here. He was a prominent business man in Halifax until he retired in 1916. He was a member of the Halifax Board of Trade and a life member of the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron and in early years was one of his favourite sports. Widely travelled and well informed he was a strong advocate of the democratic principle and a frequent visitor to the island of the philosophy of "live or let live". 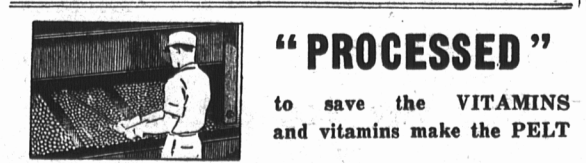
Col. C. B. Price of Westmont, Que., will be commander of the team which will sail for Bisley, England, on the S. S. Ausonia from Montreal, June 9.

Removal Of Litvinoff From Foreign Post Unexplained

MOSCOW, May 4—(AP)—Joseph Stalin took a stronger grip on Soviet Russia's foreign policy today through the displacement of Maxim Litvinoff, noted internationalist, by Premier Vyacheslav Molotov as Commissar of Foreign Affairs.

The shake-up put Stalin's "right hand" on the helm of foreign policy and removed a proponent of collective security who long has been under attack by the Rome-Berlin axis.

It stirred the Axis to jubilant exclamations and brought new uncertainty to Great Britain and France.

Only the Kremlin knew how far the Soviet course in international politics might be changed by Premier Molotov's assumption of the Foreign Commissariat in the

WHEAT BILL BEFORE HOUSE

Is Designed to Encourage Co-operative Marketing

OTTAWA, May 4—Agriculture Minister's bill to encourage the co-operative marketing of wheat received second reading in the House of Commons today without serious opposition. It was the first of his series of farm measures to be approved in principle.

Owing to the continuance of emergency conditions in the western wheat belt, the Minister indicated that the bill would not become operative this year. The probability is that the Canadian Wheat Board will handle the western crop under the same conditions as last year.

The purpose of the bill is to guarantee co-operative and other grain handling organizations against loss where they make an initial payment on pooled wheat based on 60 cents a bushel for no. 1 northern wheat at Port William.

It is called bill 32 and is additional legislation to bill 63 introduced before the House, providing for a 70-cent initial price for farmers selling to the Canadian Wheat Board.

In operation, Mr. Gardiner believed, combined with that of the acreage bonus bill, would over a period of years place the one-cash crop western wheat farmers more nearly on a cash basis than they had in the past and would improve both the marketing of wheat and the financing of western agriculture.

France Stands Firm Behind Polish Pledge

PARIS, May 4—Premier Daladier tonight denounced reports France was faltering in support of Poland by issuing a declaration that France's position "has not varied."

The statement came shortly after Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet assured the Polish Ambassador, Jules Lukasiewicz, that France stands solidly behind her commitments. Both France and Great Britain have guaranteed Poland's independence against aggression.

Daladier asserted that "the future of civilization" is at stake in the current European crisis. The text of Daladier's statement follows:

Newspapers announced this morning that the Government would return to Parliament, a statement to the chamber on the international situation. I consider that in the present circumstances that in the past but say now what will be the general sense of this position.

The position of France as I defined in my radio speech of March 22 has not varied and will not vary. Events abroad confirm by their evidence the legitimacy and necessity of our policy of vigilance and firmness. This policy has the full approval of the country, as just shown by the deliberations and motions of the departmental assemblies.

Nevertheless in France and abroad it seems that, by inexact information and tendentious commentaries, it is wished to disguise the reality of facts and to attempt either to bend the resolution of the government and nation or to give birth abroad to uncertainty on the clarity and rectitude of French policy.

I could not stand too strongly against such deformations of truth. In reality the international situation is at a point where in diversity and complexity of principal problems a single question is in fact posed, that of domination or collaboration in Europe. It is thus definitely the security of France which is at stake and also the future of civilization which we, with an immense majority of men in the world, are determined to defend.

The French people know it. Their determination is unbreakable. In present circumstances I want simply to recall it.

Gland Trouble May Stop Hens Laying Eggs

BOSTON, May 4—(AP)—If your hens aren't laying, it doesn't necessarily mean there's mutiny in the barnyard. The "gals" may have something wrong with their thyroid glands.

Dr. C. F. Winchester, University of Missouri scientist, reported today in "endocrinology," scientific publication, that removal of thyroid from a flock of white Leghorns resulted in a definite falling off of their egg production, while injection of thyroid hormone (thyroxin) restored business in the breakfast food line to close to normal again.

He said his results with fowls would seem to be analogous to the effect of milk secretion of thyroidectomy and thyroid feeding reported by another scientist, who had success in restoring milk production of thyroidectomized cows.

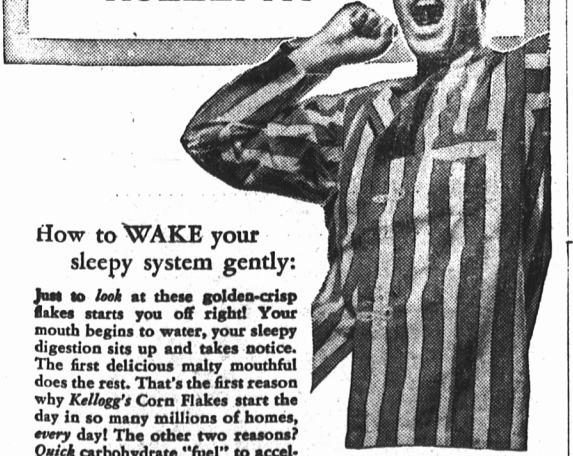
Loans Under Housing Act

(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, May 4—Finance Minister Dunning announced today National Housing Act loans approved in April were valued at \$1,408,379, an increase of 69 per cent over approvals for April, 1938. The number of family housing units financed totaled 436 compared with 235, an increase of 86 per cent.

Housing Act loans approved to April 30 totalled 8,452 for \$32,092,272. Ontario led all provinces with 4,087 loans for \$15,121,205 followed by Quebec with 2,053 at \$8,618,927. British Columbia was third with 1,391 for \$4,456,892.

Loans up to April 30 in other provinces included Prince Edward Island 15 loans at \$80,034; Nova Scotia, 469—\$1,983,470; New Brunswick, 135—\$554,417.

\$4,000,000 Nova Scotia Bond Issues

HALIFAX, May 4—(CP)—Sale of two provinces of Nova Scotia bond issues aggregating \$4,000,000 was announced tonight by the Provincial Government. The issue was awarded, on the highest bid, to a syndicate headed by W. C. Macleod and Company Limited and the Imperial Bank.

An issue of \$2,500,000 in three-year debentures bearing 1-2 per cent interest was taken up by the syndicate at \$99.60 for \$1,500,000 in 10-year debentures at 3-1-2 per cent, the price of \$98.52 was received. Proceeds will be used to refund debentures maturing May 15, totalling \$5,050,000.

An option on the additional amount of \$1,000,000 for 30 days at \$98.52 was given the same syndicate. "The price is considered very satisfactory," the Government's announcement said.

Purchasing Board Bill Before Senate

OTTAWA, May 4—A vigorous last ditch stand against the Government's Defence Purchasing Board Bill featured its passage through third reading in the Senate today.

Severe strictures were directed against the Government. Its proposals limiting non-competitive armament contract profits to five per cent were compared with current departmental contracts which yielded a considerably higher figure.

Moving third reading, Government Leader Dandurand declared both the Finance and Defence department officials had assured him the projected Purchasing Board would be able to administer the bill in such a way as to protect the Treasury and "at the same time give compensation to the contractors." One of the features of the measure is a limitation of profits to five per cent of the capital employed on a contract.

Several minor amendments were made in the bill by the Senate and it will be returned to the Commons again. The Lower House had previously passed it.
