#### Kitchen Rules.

Without cleanliness and punctuality, good cooking is impossible. Leave nothing dirty—clean and clear as you go.

A good cook wastes nothing. An hour lost in the morning has to be run after all day.

Use a strong fire for roasting and a clear fire for boiling. Boil fish quickly; meat slowly. Throw flour on kerosene flames. Slamming door of oven makes cake fall.

A few drops of lemon juice makes cake frosting very white.

Try sprinkling powdered cloves about places infested with red ants. Salt in the oven under baking tins will prevent scorching on the bottom. Salt and vinegar will remove stains from discolored teacups.

To clean cut glass, wash articles, let them dry and afterwards rub them with prepared chalk and a soft brush, carefully going into all the crevices.

When tea has been put into the teapot, it should be filled up with boiling water and not allowed to stand with a few drops of water at first.

Shine steel portions of stove with finely-powdered whiting mixed with sweet oil.

Always keep cheese well covered in a cheese dish. If wrapped in a vinegar-moistened cloth it will keep beautifully moist and retain its flavor longer.

Dish cloths are quickly made fresh and sweet by boiling in clean water with a good lump of soda added.

Always put the sugar used in a tart in the centre of the fruit, not at the top, as this makes the paste sodden.

When peeling onions, begin at the root and peel upwards, and the onions will scarcely affect the eyes at all.

In boiling meat for making soup, the meat should be put into cold water in order to extract all the goodness from the meat.
