**LITTLE HINTS.**

A corn may be eased by the application of a little oil of peppermint. Paint on window panes may be removed by washing it with vinegar. Baked things will not keep well unless thoroughly cooled before stored. To improve tough meat and make it tender rub it well with a cut lemon.

When buying fish remember it should be stiff and the flesh firm to the touch. Blankets while drying should be well beaten with a cane carpet beater to make them fluffy. To remove an ink spot from the fingers, moisten it and touch it with the sulphur end of a match. Smoked ceilings may be cleaned, by washing with cloths wrung out of water in which a small piece of washing soda has been dissolved. When an article becomes scorched in ironing, lay it over a plate or platter with a jellylike mixture of soap, starch and water. Place a piece of glass over all and lay in the sun. Remoisten as often as necessary until all the stain is removed. To make linen easier to write on when marking, dip the piece you wish to mark in cold starch, rub over with hot iron and you will be able to write without the per-
