ANCHORS STILL LEADING IN THE RACE FOR CITY FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

Trounce Rovers Yesterday In Third Game of Series by Score of 6 to 3 - Hard Fought Game from Start to Finish - Poor Attendance.

Neath smiling skies with a fair sprinkling of fans in attendance, the third game of the City League football was played yesterday at Victoria Park between the Rovers and Anchors, the latter winning the popular verdict by a score of 6 to 3.

Yesterday's set-to was more than a fair exhibition of the "fall game," in fact it ranked with any game so far played in the series; especially in the first half when both teams entered the scoring column; combination seemed to be the chief offensive and this supplemented with stiff defensive tactics made the game both interesting and exciting from start to finish.

In the first half it looked as though both squads would go to the "showers" without a timely kicking soon gave the Rovers the advantage with the result that Horne on a pass from "Tiny" Mathieson, the stalwart forward, scored for the first count—the touch was not converted, the kick falling short.

On the kick-off the Anchors forced the play, all the time playing excellent football the Rovers in the meantime being forced to ruse in order to save. Undaunted and still determined the "west ends" carried on and before the half ended, Saunders, "working nice" on the half-line carried the ball over for the tying score; the kick being unconverted.

The second half opened with honors evenly divided and both teams working like Trojans; kicking in this frame played a prominent part, especially in the closing minutes, which gave the Anchors a chance from a striking distance. On the kick-off it was Earl Prowse on a pass from Lonergan after a long kick scored for the Anchors second touch-down; the convert like the previous try went for naught, the ball falling short of the bar.

From then on the battle fought was furious and none the less creditable, both teams showing the same pep when the final whistle blew.

The Anchors won, but only after a stubborn fight against an equally stubborn foe. Their victory although praiseworthy was hard earned and only for beautiful following-up and strict attention to "business" at all times, a different

story might have been written, as the Rovers have footballists worthy of their steel.

A word here may be said with respect to the enthusiasm and zeal manifested by the City League football players this season. The fans, sad to say which are few and far between this year, fail to realize the inconvenience and added loss of time involved in the practice before these games by the players—this is evidenced by the meagre attendance which greets every game—and free passports at that; therefore it is high time that the football fans, if there are any left, should show some life and exemplify in a "small" measure by their attendance that the endeavors put forth by "our boys" are appreciated.

SYDNEY YOUTH WINS HERALD AND MAIL MARATHON RACE

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 19.—John Miles, youthful Sydney runner, won the annual Herald and Mail ten-mile modified Marathon Road Race held here Saturday, covering the course of city and suburban streets through a driving rain storm in the fastest time ever achieved by any runner since the annual event was inaugurated in 1907. His time was 53:45.5 until the course is re-measured to assure correctness of distance covered the mark will not be claimed as a record.

Ronald O'Toole, member of the St. John's, Newfoundland, team, ran a close second, keeping neck and neck with the winner until the last quarter mile, and with his team mates, capturing the team prize for the event.

A driving rain storm smothered the city throughout the day and when the runners lined up in front of the Y.M.C.A. building for the starter's signal at 2.30, they faced a course varying from soaked pavement to mud puddles and miniature brooks. In spite of this all but one of the thirty-three starters managed to make the circuit. They were soaked by the downpour and splattered with mud from head to foot, both by their own splashing through the suburban roadways and by the cars that swarmed among the runners from start to finish in spite of the efforts of officials. The runners all finished in comparatively good form, particularly the first ten to cross the line.

Miles made his winning sprint just as he and O'Toole left South street on the last stretch up Barrington street to the finish line, and the plucky little Newfoundland runner was unable to make the pace set by the Sydney man.

O'Toole finished fifty yards behind the winner, his time being 54:04.25.
