—DIED IN SUMMERSIDE.—The death took place at her home Sunday morning of Mrs. Thomas Gallant at the age of 52 years. The funeral takes place Tuesday morning to St. Paul's Cemetery.

—PRODUCE MOVING.—Produce is now beginning to move freely to Summerside but with the exception of oats which are now 45 cents. Potatoes are 40 cents, pork 11c to 15c geese and duck 25 to 30 cts, turkeys 40 to 45 cts, chicken 15 to 20 and fowl 12 to 15 cents.

—DIES IN ST. JOHN.—The death took place at St. John N. B. on Monday of Mrs. Alice Silliphant aged 99 years. The deceased was an aunt of Mr. Levi Silliphant Summerside. She is survived by four sons and one daughter, forty grand-children, ninety-eight great grand children and nineteen great great grand children.

—HARBOR FROZEN.—The heavy frost of Saturday night has made a heavy lull in Summerside harbor, and if one or two more nights frost continues the closing of the harbor will be closed for the season, this is much later than last year as the Bedeque ferry boat "King Albert" ceased running the 20th of Nov last year.

—RECEIVES INJURIES.—Mr. Wm. J. McLean of Central Lot met with painful injuries on Monday when his right arm was badly fractured above the elbow as a result of a kick from a horse. Mr. McLean was in the act of leading a horse in the stable and as he was passing the stall of another horse the animal kicked vigorously. Mr. McLean received severe bruises as well as the broken arm.

—TO ENTER LEAGUE.—At the meeting of the Summerside Hockey League held Tuesday night it was decided to enter the Eastern section of the N. B. and P. E. I. Hockey League. An invitation had been extended several days ago. The eastern section of the N. B. and P. E. I. Hockey League will comprise the following teams: Saskville, Dorchester, Port Elgin, Charlottetown and Summerside. The Summerside League will carry on as last year for local games with three teams competing and a picked team of the three teams will make up the league team for the outside games.

This shows the wisdom of marketing farm products by utilizing the dairy cow, since milk products remain less essential from the farm, than are transferred when the raw products are sold. This is easily established when you compare the quantity of soil fertilizer in dairy and in raw products. Then the byproducts can be fed to stock and poultry, which are as surely a source of revenue on every well ordered and successfully managed farm. Christmas trade looms bright on the commercial horizon and the prospect seems to glow with stars of the first magnitude.
