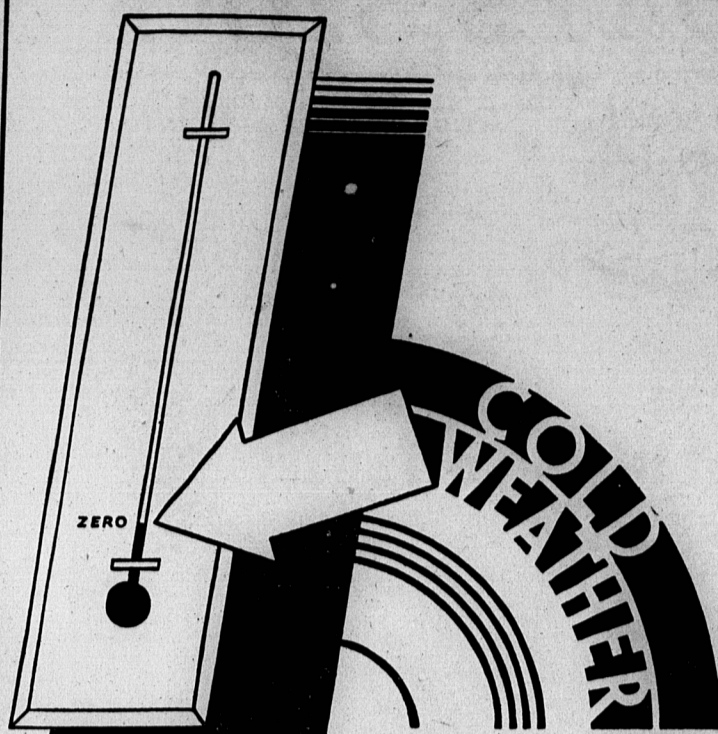

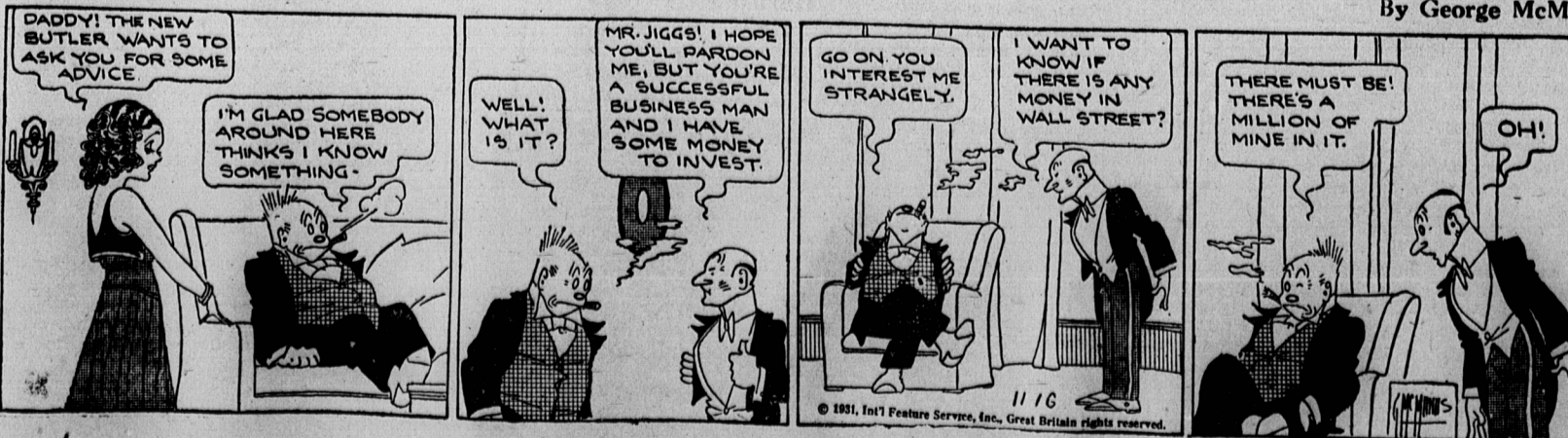

DRUNKEN DRIVING DOUBLED IN FOUR YEARS

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 14 - The number of intoxicated drivers has been increasing steadily from year to year and the total of license suspensions and revocations for this cause in New York state having risen from 2,433 in 1926 to 5,667 last year, J. R. Crossley, vice president

of the New York Automobile club, has just revealed. He declared that the drunken operator had contributed "in no small measure" to the total of 3,090 motor fatalities in the State during 1930, of which 1,163 occurred in this city.

In the past six years Mr. Crossley said, 21,519 driving licenses were suspended or revoked because the operators had been charged with, or convicted of, driving a car while intoxicated.
