Among the Churches

At St. Paul's Parish Hall on Tuesday afternoon a gathering of more than one hundred women greeted Mrs. D. B. Donaldson of Toronto the Dominion Treasurer of the Women's Auxiliary to the Missionary Society. Mrs. Donaldson is visiting the Maritime Provinces in the interest of a Forward Movement of the Society, and speaks with first hand knowledge of the Canadian field. In a rousing address lasting a full hour she told of the opportunity at the door of Canadian Church women to advance the cause of their Church and of Christ in our own land and beyond the seas. A social hour followed when afternoon tea was served by a committee of ladies under the leadership of Mrs. W. E. Bentley.

On Wednesday at St. Elizabeth's Church, Springfield there was an all day session of the representative women of the several Anglican congregations in their semi-annual meeting. At 10.30 in the morning there was a Communion service at which Archdeacon White was the celebrant, and Rev. H. D. Raymond the preacher. After luncheon was served by the ladies of Springfield in the Temperance Hall, the afternoon meeting convened in the church in regular business session. After routine business had been dispatched Mrs. Donaldson pointed of the Society's work, and sounded the appeal for advance. So large was the gathering that the seating of the Church was taxed to its utmost capacity. There was another partaking of generous Springfield hospitality, before the delegates set out in the evening for their various homes.

Mrs. Donaldson accompanied by a group of ladies from St. Paul's visited Georgetown and Cherry Valley yesterday where representative gatherings were held. Today they proceeded to Port Hill for a meeting this evening. Of interest will be the service in St. Paul's on Wednesday afternoon next at 4.00 o'clock, part of the fiftieth anniversary celebration of the Grand Lodge A. F. and A. M. of P. E. I. The preacher Canon Shafford of Montreal is widely known as one of the brilliant leaders of the Canadian Church. After the reading of the Masonic body, the remainder of the Church accommodation will be available to the general public who are invited. The Annual Confirmation service will be held in the Church next Thursday evening by the Most Reverend Archbishop Wdrell, who will preach. At this service also the public will be cordially welcome.

The Young Ladies Guild of the Baptist Church held its final meeting of the season on Tuesday at the home of Mrs. G. L. Simpsons.

On Wednesday afternoon the Mission Band of St. James Church held its closing meeting, which was conducted entirely by the children, with Master Harry Laphorne presiding. A pleasing program of recitations and readings and songs was given by the children, and included a selection on the bag-pipes by masters Ian and Willie Burnett.

The management reserve the right to declare off, change order of programme, decline any entry, bar any driver, declare off and fill without re-advertising, any races not satisfactorily filled. If weather is stormy, or track is in unfavorable condition so that racing cannot be carried on at the time advertised, the management reserve the right to postpone or declare the races off; and return the entrance monies. Two horses under same ownership may start in any race. Hay, straw, and stabling free. National Trotting Association Rules to govern except where they conflict with the above conditions.
