**CURIOUS DISEASE AFFECTING BEES**

LONDON July 30.—The prevalence of paralysis, which is reported to have slain half the bees in the Isle of Wight, raises an interesting question. This is, whether bees, like human beings, are the victims of the higher civilization. Years ago, when the nineteenth-century bee lived in the primitive straw "skep," without any of the modern conveniences he led a more or less happy existence, in which, so far as seems to be known, paralysis played no part. But now that the twentieth-century bee lives in a "wasm" dwelling—the name suggests a Chicago skyscraper—with all kinds of scientific devices embodied in it, paralysis is laying him low. Moreover the disease is said to have originated in the United States, where the rush of civilization is keenest. The disease of bee-paralysis is more or less a mystery. The disease may have existed in earlier times, it was explained, but may never have been noticed, owing to the difficulty which attended bee-observation when straw skeps were used.
