After nine o'clock hundreds of men and boys gathered at market square at the junction of King, Prince William and Dock streets in the very centre of the city...

After midnight the mob moved on to the car barns where the strike breakers are. Five hundred men and boys showered the place with a volley of stones but did not succeed in breaking the windows.
