an acreage crop value of \$50.24. In the case of mangels, it cost \$72.45 an acre to produce the crop and the yield of 17.81 tons per acre, valued at \$191.1 a ton, was worth only \$34.02; or, mangels showed a loss per acre of \$28.43. Potatoes on the other hand proved a particularly profitable crop showing a surplus of \$97.94 per acre over cost of production; potatoes cost \$80.99 per acre to produce and yielding 192.4 bushels, valued at \$3.44 per bushel, a total value of \$657.93.

These figures afford some indication of the importance to the farmer of knowing what his crops cost him. The detailed information with respect to production cost available in the annual report is well worth having.

Late Market News

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 17.—(Produce)—The new tariff announced on butter by Prime Minister Bennett in the House of Commons yesterday gave the local market considerable strength today and values were advanced. Eastern townships no. 1 pasteurized creamery butter in large lots, which on Tuesday was selling at 29 3/4 cents per pound could not be bought for less than 32 cents per pound today and there were many quotations above this figure. Quotations to retailers for small lots, were definitely put up two cents per pound to 34 cents for solids and 25 cents for prints. The trade was quiet. The cheese market was overshadowed by the great interest in butter duties. Asking prices were 15 1/2 to 15 3/4 cents for Ontario cheese, 15 to 15 1/4 cents for Quebec cheese. Receipts were 2,375 boxes.

Livestock Market

MONTREAL, Que., Sep. 17.—There were 48 cattle, 79 calves, 38 hogs and 738 lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. The cattle were made up of a couple of loads of fair to medium quality north west steers and a dozen or so good cows. The steers were quoted between \$6 and \$6.50 and the cows between \$5 and \$5.50. Hogs were unchanged at \$12.25 for bacon, with \$7 per hog premium on select. Calves and lambs just arrived early today and were not sold. Quotations were easier.
