Tweed suit details include colored pipings, pouch pockets colored on skirt belts, the use of border tweed with the border forming a broad stripe at the side of the skirt, or at yoke and waistbands on jackets, or collars and pockets on dresses.

There are tricks in handling jerseys when making them up. A research department has recently compiled the most essential tricks of handling jersey, as follows:

1. When cutting a garment from jersey fabric, lay the pattern on the wrong side of the material to prevent the edges from rolling.
2. Immediately after cutting, reinforce the neck edges, armholes and bias or curved sections with basting thread which serves as a temporary stay.
3. In machine-stitching rayon jersey, use a very fine needle in your machine, medium long stitch and light tension. Be careful to lift up any bulk of material as you pull on the seam under the presser foot.
4. In handling, keep on a long, flat surface. Working at a table

provides the support necessary to prevent sagging or distortion.

5. Pinking is the best method to follow in finishing the seams, since the successive bias "bites" tend to seal and keep the line.

6. When employing buttonholes, eyelets, hooks and eyes or snap fasteners, reinforce the closing with an interlining of crinoline or muslin.

Very little pressing is needed for jersey fabrics except at the hemline and seams. When pressing, lift the iron and place it against the fabric, avoiding any undue pressure or pushing of the iron across the surface.

TABLE ETIQUETTE

There are some general rules for serving a meal which everyone should know.

1. Place, serve and remove the dishes from the table using left hand, all except beverages, which are poured and placed from the right.
2. Work from left to right.
3. The place in front of guest should never be left bare until after the salad.
4. Glasses are never lifted from the table.

KNOT HOLES REQUIRE SIELLAC FOR PAINT

For preparing lumber with knot holes in it for painting, the Painting and Decorating Contractors of America have adopted certain specifications which are under quite general use. These rules require that knots and sappy places in new lumber be primed first of all.

After priming is dry, a coat of half-liquid shellac and half-denatured alcohol—or else a thin coat of aluminum varnish should be applied. Of course many painters still prefer to shellac the knots before putting on the priming coat.

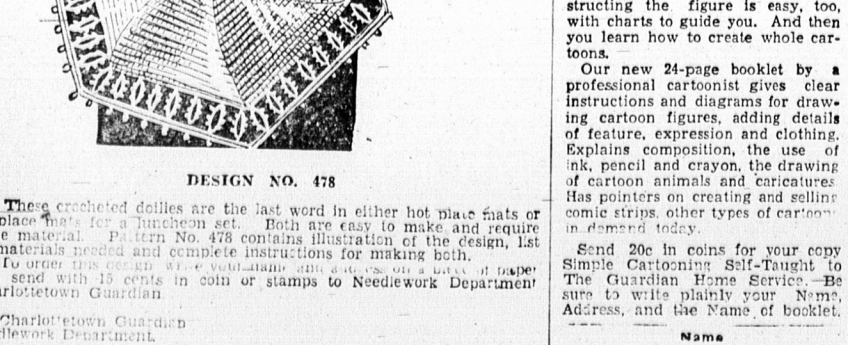
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
