"There is nothing further to report on this except that the Commission is awaiting with interest the findings in the special survey which is expected to be submitted to the Dominion Government and the Province of Nova Scotia this fall."

During the year the Commission also had filed briefs protesting the lowering of freight rates to "Portland, Me., and complained about delay in handling imports and exports through Maritime ports. "Considerable improvement in the handling of export and import shipments was experienced over the previous winter due to a large part to an improved system which the railways implemented." The report also mentioned the 21st annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade, representing 90 Maritime boards, got away to a swift opening with a discussion on Communism stemming out of a resolution by the Halifax board.

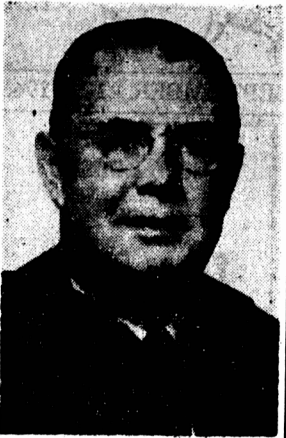
FAST STEEL PRODUCTION

Dr. William E. Dudley, who began his guest ministry at Trinity United Church, Charlottetown this Sunday, preaching at both the morning and evening services which just completed fourteen week summer guest ministry at St. James United Church in Montreal.

Dr. Dudley was born in Leintwardine, Shropshire, England, beginning his studies for the ministry in that country. He began his student ministry in Canada on the missionary fields of Manitoba. He was graduated from the University of North Dakota and Wesley College. Later he attended Harvard University for special study. In 1921 the degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by his Alma Mater, and in 1932 he received the degree of Doctor of Laws.

Throughout his career he has conducted summer ministries in Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver. He has crossed the ocean on seven occasions as British Lutheran minister, and has conducted preaching missions and summer guest ministries in King's Weigh House, London, also three different churches in Glasgow, and other important centres in the old land.

Large American Potato Co. Opens Branch In P.E.I.

The farmers of Prince Edward Island will be pleased to know that a new potato company has recently been formed in Charlottetown, to be known as the Lavitt Potato Company Limited. This company has been organized under the Lavitt Potato Co. of Rockville, Conn. and Mr. M. B. Buell, this city, Mr. Buell, who will be manager, has had many years experience in potato farming and has been for the past few years associated with the Thompson Produce Company Limited of Charlottetown.

The Lavitt Potato Company of Rockville, Conn., is well known throughout Canada, being one of the largest buyers of seed potatoes for the American market. A large warehouse is presently being constructed at the approach to the Hillboro Bridge, which, when completed will hold upwards of one hundred cars. The warehouse will be completely modern with up-to-date equipment, including graders, escalators and facilities for packaging table potatoes. At a later date, a plant is to be installed for waxing tubers.

The building will contain a suite of offices which when completed will be among the finest in the city. Mr. Edwin Lavitt, who is at present in the city, feels that the new organization will be of great benefit to the farmers of the Island. It will be possible for growers to store their potatoes in the warehouse, where they can be graded and prepared for the market at a time when weather and pest conditions are with normal shipping operations.

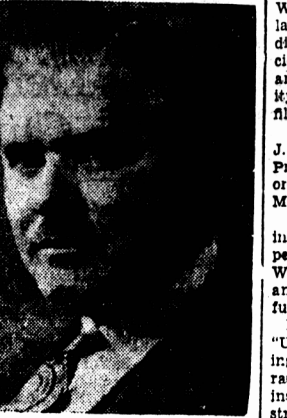
