WAR SOUVENIRS.—Many wonderful interesting souvenirs of the terrible fighting round Ypres are to be seen in the southern window of Messrs. Moore & McLeod's clothing store. These consist of shell helmets, bits of shrapnel, a German helmet bearing on its front the evidence of the deadly marksmanship of our Canadian riflemen, buttons from the uniforms of French, British, Canadian and German soldiers, from the dum-dum bullets of German origin, clips of cartridges found in German trenches, etc. An especially interesting souvenir is a cartridge which stopped a German bullet, saving the wearer's life. These interesting souvenirs were sent home by Weeks and other members of the signalling corps, to Prince Street School, in acknowledgment of the untiring effort of that splendid school to keep the boys at the front informed as to interesting events at home. For months past, and even during the vacation a scrap book of items of interest, photographs, and the like, is carefully compiled by scholars of this institution and sent forward weekly to the front, where it is a welcome and much appreciated visitor to the boys under arms.

IN MEMORIAM

MR DONALD MCDONALD.
Death has again visited the home of Mr. Donald McDonald of Ruskin. Mr. McDonald was born in Scotland and came to Prince Edward Island when 16 years old. His father was a pensioner of the Battle of Waterloo and witnessed the burial of Sir John Moore. He was 97 years of age and leaves to mourn a wife, 5 sons and 3 daughters, Hugh and Alex. of Bangor, Maine, Dan of Charlottetown, Anthony and Joseph of Ruskin and Mrs. Barrett of Mount Stewart, Mrs. Grant of East Point, Mrs. John M. Campbell of Ruskin. The late Mr. McDonald was a kind husband and a loving father and a good honest upright man. He will be greatly missed in the neighborhood and among all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He received the last rites of his church from the Rev. father Ignatius. A large concourse of people followed the remains to the last resting place. May his soul rest in peace.

RUBY CHAMPION.
Mr. and Mrs. H.L. Champion of Darnley have the heartfelt sympathy of

their many friends in the death of their little daughter, Ruby, aged five and a half years. She was taken ill on Monday morning and died on Tuesday. She was a bright lovable child and was a great favorite with all. MR. JAMES TRAINOR.
The death of Mr. James Trainor, of the P. E. I., Charlottetown, to which we briefly referred in our last issue, removes a man of very high character—one whose good qualities will not soon fade from memory. Mr. Trainor became ill about two months ago of stomach trouble which he fought courageously, but he gradually failed, and having received the rites of the Catholic Church, he was peacefully to rest on the 8th inst. The late Mr. Trainor was 46 years of age, and was born at Kingston in this County, where he resided until some fifteen years ago when he removed with his wife and family to this city. In business affairs he was noted for sterling honesty and also by word and deed lent all the aid in his power to moral and religious objects. He was an honored member of the Benevolent Irish Society holding the responsible position of Treasurer for some years past and at the time of his death. He was also a valued member of the C. M. B. A., and was held in high esteem by his fellow members. He is survived by his wife and four children, his aged mother, four brothers and one sister who have the sympathy of many friends. Rev. Thomas Trainor, P. P., Sault St. Marie, his youngest brother, arrived home on Thursday night and was present at the funeral with his other brothers and sisters. His funeral took place on Saturday morning to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where High Requiem Mass was offered by Rev. Father Duffy, thence to St. Dunstan's Cemetery, where the service was performed by Rev. Father McQuail. To the bereaved widow and family we tender our sincere sympathy.
