After the business meeting Miss Mary Allison Wood, Cape Traverse, gave an interesting address on pottery, demonstrating with Island clay which she used successfully in her own work. It was announced that during November there would be shown an exhibit of works of the Royal Canadian Academy.

PRODUCERS AND VENDORS ELECT SLATE - Mr. Guy Road, Brackley was re-elected president of the Charlottetown Milk Producers and Vendors Association at the annual meeting of the organization last night. Other officers elected include Mr. Ambrose Mallett, vice-president; Eugene Culbertson, secretary. Re-elected. Besides the above the directors include Messrs. Fred McRae, W. W. Mutch, Roland Beaton and C. M. Cox. Routine business was transacted at the meeting. A review of the year's activities was given by the president. Other officers represented the financial statement.

TEACHERS' STUDY GROUP - On Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock a study group of twelve teachers will be held at Morell School. Supervisor A. S. Woolner called the meeting to order and asked for an election of officers. The following officers were appointed: President, Leslie Stewart, Bangor; Vice President, Elizabeth Webster, Morell; Secretary, Alice MacCarthy, Bangor; Questionnaire Box, Com. Jerome O'Brien, Simons Road; Press Com. Elizabeth Webster. The president then took the chair and called upon Professor Reddin of P. W. C who stressed the importance of the subject being thoroughly taught in the schools. In late years people have run away with the idea of training the bright fellow for a city job and letting the dull fellow stay home on the farm. It is high time they wakened up to realize that agriculture is our great industry and it needs trained men as truly as any other industry does. A desire for such study needs to be instilled in the schools by a visual study of the natural things around us. Parents may do a great deal by supplying material for the teachers to work with. In many districts teachers are asked to teach with a very inadequate supply of material. Prof. Reddin gave the teachers many references to Nature Study material. Last year's Matriculation exam in Rural Science set by Prof. Reddin was discussed and many helpful suggestions received from the teachers. A vote of thanks moved by Mr. O'Brien and seconded by Mr. Reid was extended to Prof. Reddin for his extremely interesting and instructive address. The question box was next on the program. Mr. Woolner then announced the date of next meeting as Nov. 15 in Morell School and distributed questionnaires to be discussed at next meeting. The teachers greatly appreciate the work of the supervisor in planning such programs for their study group meetings. The meeting was then adjourned.

Recall Death Of Island Man In Hour Of Victory In War Reminiscences

The memory of Canada and the Canadian Corps which relieved Mons of the German invader 20 years ago is kept ever green by the Belgian city and one of the most important sections in its war museum is devoted to a collection representative of the Canadian forces. An article by Captain W. W. Murray, M. C., Canadian Press Staff writer says: Speaking of one of two Canadian guns in a museum at Mons the writer says: The other gun is a 4.5 howitzer, once in the service of the 36th Battery, C. F. A. The accompanying scroll says: "This gun was firing in the barrage at 177 hours, Nov. 10, 1918, on the canal bank, at the southwestern outskirts of Mons. The Germans opened fire at once on the battery. Lieut. P. J. Longworth, standing behind the gun directing the fire, was mortally wounded by the first explosion which was between him and the gun. The gunners were wounded by the backward effect of the explosion. Lieut. Longworth was killed in action in the 3rd Division Artillery, and was buried in the cemetery at Jenappe."

Was Native Of Charlottetown

The Lieut. Longworth referred to above was a son of the late Lieut. Col. J. A. Longworth, military attaché, Charlottetown, and has many relatives in this city. The 36th Battery, C. F. A. referred to was commanded in France by Lieut. Col. D. A. MacKinnon, D. S. O., of Charlottetown until about a month before the armistice when he took command of the 9th Brigade, C. F. A., of which the 36th Battery was a part. Lieut. Longworth was buried in the cemetery at Jenappe on November 11, 1918, armistice morning and the funeral was attended not only by the officers and members of the 36th Brigade, C. F. A. but also by a great many Belgian women who were greatly distressed and expressed themselves as very sad because of the young man's death in the hour of victory. Lieut. Longworth had a gallant career, crossing to France with the 36th Battery on July 14, 1916 and taking part in the battle of the Somme, Hill 70, in fact all the battles with the exception of those which took place during the time he was hospitalized to England because of wounds. He was presented with the Military Cross in recognition of extreme coolness and bravery under fire.

Rev. R. H. Stavert, Wood Island, P. E. I., was elected moderator of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island at the annual meeting of the organization at St. James Presbyterian Church Monday. Other officers elected include: Home Missions Convener - Rev. G. C. Webster. Foreign Missions - Rev. W. L. Dettlor. Budget - Rev. A. S. MacLean. Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies - Rev. W. Wadland. Historical Committee - Rev. Dr. P. Thompson. Evangelism, Church Life and Work - Rev. W. VerWolfe. Students and Colleges - Rev. J. C. Neill. Secretary - Rev. T. O. Hughes. Session Records - Rev. Dr. A. D. Thompson. Statistics - Rev. W. L. Dettlor. Transportation - Rev. J. C. McNeill. Pensions - Rev. R. H. Stavert. Clerk - Rev. W. O. Rhoad. Treasurer - Mr. A. Chas. It was agreed Mr. White had contributed greatly to his talents and ability to the Presbytery. The Presbytery's congregations were declared vacant, and the Interim Moderator will be Rev. William VerWolfe of Summerside.

Retreat For Clergy Opened Yesterday

A retreat for Protestant Clergy in the Province opened yesterday afternoon in Zion Church, Charlottetown. Ministers of various Communions throughout the province were in attendance. Rev. Canon Haslam, for 15 years a Missionary in India and for several years principal of Emmanuel Theological College, Saskatoon, conducted the retreat. Canon Haslam took as his theme for this evening, "The Need and Source of Evangelism." This message was followed by an open conference. At 8.00 p. m. the retreat was resumed. The theme for meditation was "The Holy Spirit." An open conference concluded a day rich in meditation prayer and Christian fellowship. The retreat will continue this morning and afternoon.
