—NEW WAREHOUSE—The new potato warehouse at O'Leary, now practically completed is one of the largest and best in the province. Its dimensions are 120 x 40 feet with a 10-foot basement of reinforced concrete insulated to provide absolute protection from frost in any weather. This is divided into bins for the convenience of growers, which can be rented for the season at a reasonable rental. Above the basement the upper part is also thoroughly insulated, providing the same protection from frost as below. Situated on the new spur in O'Leary, and for which the railway management are deserving of thanks, accommodation has been made to place three standard cars at once, thereby facilitating the unloading of different commodities. It is the intention of the company, which is composed of some of the leading farmers and potato growers of O'Leary and vicinity, to handle all kinds of farm produce, specializing in certified seed potatoes of the highest quality grown under government inspection and sold under their own brand and trade-mark. Storage facilities are also provided for all who wish to take advantage of same, as far as space will allow.

—OLD PLOW THE BEST—Mr. Allan Gillis, Hay River, one of the largest growers of seed potatoes on the North Side, did not use his improved potato digger this fall as all in getting out his large crop of Cobblers and Mountains. Instead, he plowed them out and dug them in the old-fashioned way, and in this way filled his big new potato warehouse to the roof.

—400 BUSHELS PER ACRE—Is certainly a big crop of potatoes. Not many this year were able to grow such a crop on account of the blight striking most crops so early, thus cutting off several weeks of growth and proportionately reducing the yield. In this seed crop business experience counts as in everything else. Mr. Chester McDonald, Clear Springs, who was one of the first to go into certified seed growing, has just finished harvesting a crop of 400 bushels per acre. This remarkable yield is probably the only 400 per acre yield in the Eastern section, taking the whole crop into calculation, was grown near the seashore in summer—(a) sowed seed and 1200 lbs fertilizer, followed by persistent spraying, though spraying this year, did not appear to be a remedy.
