SURVEY SHIP IN PORT - The Canadian Government survey ship "Acadia" arrived in port early yesterday morning and moored at the Marine Wharf. The ship has been engaged in survey work along the Labrador coast all summer. A tug and supplies have been loaded on the ship which will sail for Halifax. Captain Frank Ryan is in command of the ship.

Mr. R. W. Cautley, Ottawa, National Parks Surveyor, is at present making a tour of Prince Edward Island's National Park. He is accompanied by Mr. Cromarty who with Mr. Williamson, the deputy commissioner of Parks, made a lengthy inspection of proposed sites in the Province.

FAIRNORTH ARRIVED IN PORT - The S. S. Fairnorth arrived in port yesterday morning at 8 o'clock. As soon as the ship docked longshoremen began the task of loading the 70,000 bushels of turnip which will compose the bulk of the ship's cargo. The work continued until one o'clock last night and will begin again early this morning. It is expected that the ship will be loaded and ready to sail late this afternoon. Several passengers made the trip from Boston.

Fire which broke out at two o'clock this morning completely destroyed the large general store of A. D. Fehan, Mt. Stewart. Starting apparently in the dry goods department and spreading rapidly throughout the remainder of the building and attached warehouse the fire caused a loss estimated early this morning at \$8,000.00.

The fire was discovered by Constable Edwards of the Mounted Police. Volunteer firemen quickly gathered and bucket brigades were formed in a desperate attempt to save the building. Despite all efforts, however, the flames swept onward and residents began to fear that the village would be burned out. A call for assistance was sent to Charlottetown and fifteen firemen with the big pumper left for Mt. Stewart at 3:20 this morning.
