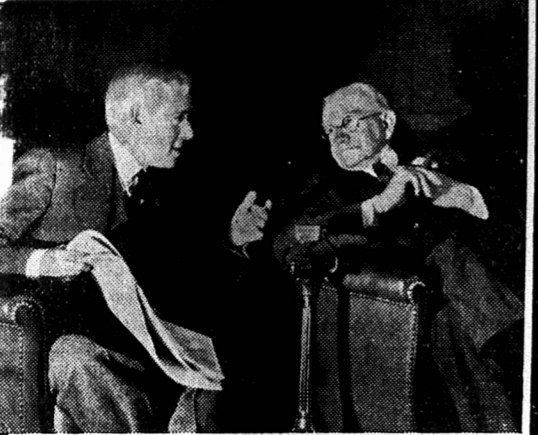

Historic Trinity Church Georgetown

Sunday, May 22nd, the Festival of the Holy Trinity marked another year in the history of the Church of the Holy Trinity at Georgetown. It is estimated to be somewhere about its 120th year of service to Almighty God, though no direct or exact date can be given.

Last year it was estimated as being 91 years of formation but from other information and the older inhabitants reveal its age to be greater than that. This is also corroborated by a Baptism of a person long since dead. The early records of the church are missing so that no concrete or real date can truthfully be given unless other information than that at present, is given to the church.

The present building is the same in fabric as when erected except when some odd forty-six years ago the ceiling was raised to form an arch shape and the east wall extended and the church itself reflects the sturdy workmanship of the past for it is still on the exterior in strong and sound shape, and is only of wooden structure, but has stood and is still standing the efforts of time and age.

The interior is not in very good condition. It is badly in need of painting. A great many have been baptized and confirmed within its walls since last it was painted. In 1846 a school house was erected for educational purposes and the classes conducted by the late Jas. Easton, who is now at rest in Trinity Cemetery, a tract of ground he cared for and loved so well.

Many a prominent Islander received his first education, all the older inhabitants of Georgetown, and men and women now living in other parts of the Maritimes, received their education in the old Trinity Day School and remember the old saintly schoolmaster, James Easton.

A part of the old school stands and is at present used as a Parish Hall. The wings and rear of the school had to be torn down as they were in decay. Those of the Island who were educated in the school can still see the entrance to recall memories of days that are past and gone, indeed the Parish of the Holy Trinity contains much of the history of the eastern end of our Island. Perhaps some of these names will bring visions of the past before you: Messrs. J. N. Lavers, R. Head, J. B. Goff, W. B. Atkins, Jas. Easton, T. Loveday, Dr. Kaye, William Sanderson, as well as many prominent Anglican Priests, now passed on to greater glory. All these men worked hard to bring others to the knowledge of the Blessed Saviour.

An old church still calling by the aid of an old bell, calling to people to remember their Lord and Master; an old church, and old school to build up strong sons and daughters of the Island. The church was dedicated to the Holy Trinity and truly God the Father, Son and Holy Ghost have watched over their protectorate and kept it safe during troubles, struggles and quarrels.

The church stands as a symbol of the Christian faith in Georgetown. The congregation has greatly decreased. There is only a few left struggling and trying to keep its doors open. A great number of the older parishioners have passed on to greater glory, some have moved from the parish, some have been baptized and confirmed within its walls yet today forget the church of their childhood and the faith and courage of their fathers.

But the hand of the Holy Trinity always seems to hover over the church and bless its struggling efforts and the Cross shines upon all who gaze at it.

Grants from outside sources aid the church to some extent for which the parish is grateful.

The Parish is under the Rev. Canon Malone, M. A., of St. Peter's Cathedral, Charlottetown, and Captain Francis Kelly of the Church Army at Georgetown. The parishioners are proud of the church and its past and pray that the interior may soon be painted to the Glory of God and His Kingdom.

It is hoped that the co-operation

of the Anglican clergy on the Island may be obtained to hold a day of special service within the walls of the old church of the Holy Trinity.

U.S. POLICE ARE STILL IN THE DOLDRUMS

HOPEWELL, N. J., May 25—The Lindbergh murder investigators took advantage of a spring Sunday's calm to unwind a tangled skein of clues today and to dismiss Dean H. Dobson-Peacock as "insignificant" in their main quest. An official police bulletin so classifying the Norfolk (Va.) clergyman who formerly held charges in Regina, Sask., and Windsor, Ont., was regarded as an indication the combined state and federal forces now are determined to press the pursuit of the baby killers without permitting side issues to occupy a moment of their time.

The statement was not regarded, however, as abandonment of an often-expressed desire of state police to confront John Hughes Curtis, jailed "hoax negotiator," with the clergyman who was associated with him in the faked activities. Plans for the prosecution of Curtis are in the hands of Prosecutor Anthony M. Hanck with Prosecutor Erwin E. Marshall concentrating on the murder enquiry, itself.

The intensified attempt to track down the actual kidnappers, now that the mythical negotiations have been swept from the picture, centered in a hunt for the run-ripper who described two days before Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., was found dead, how the child had been killed and where the body had been secreted. Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, chief of the investigation,

said the search was still going on. Already the New Jersey State troopers put on the gangster's trail have picked up several underworld characters believed to have been the fugitive, but the run-ripper who boasted of his "inside" knowledge is still at large.

WOULD COMBAT U. S. TARIFF

OTTAWA, May 25—(By The Canadian Press)—Declaring that it might not yet be too late to prevent the bill passing congress, G. B. Nicholson (Cons. Algoma East), yesterday urged upon the Dominion Government that some retaliatory action be taken against the United States in respect to the proposed tariff increase on lumber and copper.

The proposed increase in the tariff on lumber and copper practically destroy any export business in these commodities from Canada to the United States, Mr. Nicholson declared. He made his protest on a motion to go into supply. At this stage members are permitted to discuss any subject.

Earlier in the day, Mr. Nicholson had suggested the imposition of an excise duty on processed copper coming from the United States, and also an export duty on nickel from Canada to that country. He had also stated that low grade lumber from the United States was being dumped into Canada.

Pickpocket Steals Pickpocket's Teeth

CHICAGO, May 25—(A.P.)—Paul Prescher, 37, described by police as a veteran pickpocket, was distressed.

He complained in the Detective Bureau yesterday that he had been robbed, and he wanted the police to do something about it. "What," demanded Michael Phelan, the lockup keeper, "do you mean to say the leading pickpocket of

the loop has had his pocket picked?" "No," said Prescher, "my false teeth were picked right out of my mouth by some one."

Semaphore signals, similar to those on railways, are being tested as guides for pedestrians at Brighton, England.

Mr. John F. Condon, the "Jafsie" who paid the \$50,000 ransom, abandoned for the day his attempt to find in some rogues' gallery the likeness of "John," the ransom-receiver. After spending yesterday afternoon and evening in an unexplained dash into New England and back, he put in what was for him a normal day—church in the morning, a trip to a neighborhood store, a chat on a street corner, a perusal of the newspapers, and then a ball game near his Bronx (New York City) home.
