Close to 2,500 fans witnessed a spectacular day's racing at Northam yesterday, when four classes totalling 52 entries were run off. And in each and every heat, fast times, thrilling, eyelash finishes and spectacular driving were the big features.

A little bit of everything that goes to make harness racing the "Sport of Kings" was witnessed in yesterday's meet. Paul Abbe, Power Bros, good trotter lowered his mark to 2:11 as he trotted off with the 2:28 Trot and Pace; All Grattan, starting 100 feet behind the scratches, lived up to all advance notices as he won the featured Handicap Free-For-All from a field of ten; Raymond Budlong, fast three-year-old of Well McNeil's today has a mark of 2:18 after winning the three-year-old race and that after finishing third in the first heat and to complete it Bebe McElwyn showed too much class for the field as she won the 2:21 Trot and Pace in straight heats from another classy field.

Even the weather man combined to make the day an ideal one; brilliant sunshine a lightning-fast track and big fields all added to the program and then the huge crowd saw four drivers unseated during the scoring all escaping without injury and also had the added kick of witnessing two drivers paying fines—when they persisted in beating the pole horse to the wire after repeated warnings from the starter.

A big program was run off in a smooth and efficient manner and much credit goes to the capable officials who handled the meet. Starter, Dr. F. C. Dugan, faced with big fields of fine class did a thorough and workmanlike job getting the program over in three hours and a half and at all times had full control of his fields. His work pleased the big majority of the fans present.

3-Year-Old Trot & Pace

1st Heat: Eight starters came to the wire for the first heat of the afternoon. Hilda Budlong went away on the pole on the second score and made every post a winning one as she paced steadily all the way to win by a length over Bonnie Budlong. All through the first half the field remained in the same position as they left the wire. But as they hit into the backstretch positions began to change.
