**REVENUE INCREASE**  
(Special to the Guardian)  
**OTTAWA, April 30.**—A sixty-five per cent. increase in Canadian customs revenue is shown by the figures for the month of April just ended as compared with those for the same month of last year.

The revenue for the past month was \$10,336,000 which was \$4,070,000 more than the corresponding month of 1915 when it was \$6,266,000. April is the first month of the present fiscal year and its showing is worthy in this connection that the customs revenue of April 1915 exhibited a decrease of \$200,000 as compared with the same month in 1914 so that in starting off the present fiscal year with a four million dollar advance Canadian revenues are making an exceptionally good showing.
