Brisk Selling On New York Stock Market

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—The stock market had rough sailing today as realizing came to the fore in a brisk selling movement around the noon hour.

While aircraft, metals and a few others were in demand in late dealings, and exercised some stiffening effect on other sections of the list, many active issues ended down 1 to 2 points.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks lost .5 of a point at 5:44. The 15 stock divisions of rail and utilities each declined .7 of a point, while the 30 utilities resisted a little better off .5 of a point.

Turnover was sufficiently active during the peak of the early-afternoon selling to leave the ticker several minutes behind floor transactions, but for the full session only 2,190,560 shares changed hands. This was a little more than the average of the past fortnight or so.

Growing international political tension over the Mediterranean crisis was again an unsettling market influence.

The bond market, mixed in the corporate division, showed the effects of the European situation most clearly in declines of 1 to nearly 4 points in various Italian loans.

U. S. government obligations varied between losses of 6-32 and gains of 3-32 of a point, with minus signs predominating.

President Roosevelt's Atlanta address, with its assurance that "we have passed the peak of appropriations," coming late in the trading day, had no clear-cut market repercussions, but was welcomed by that large section of Wall Street opinion which has advocated a reduction in government expenditures.

Stocks that managed to end higher included Cerro de Pasco at 58 1/8, U. S. Smelting at 103 1/2, Kennecott at 28 1/4, International Nickel at 40 1/8, Allied Chemical at 164, United Aircraft at 22 1/4 and General Motors at 54 1/2.

In the Canadian list price changes were well mixed. Declines of more than a point were recorded in Distillers-Seagrams and Lake Shore while fractional recessions occurred in Canadian Pacific, Dome Mines, Canadian Industrial Alcohol "B", Ford of Canada "A", Massey Harris and Hiram Walker, Dominion Stores, McIntyre-Porcupine, Iron Scales, Hollinger and Canadian Industrial Alcohol "A" were slightly higher.

MINING

TORONTO, Nov. 29.—The inevitable profit-taking period hit the mining section of the Toronto exchange today and the base metal group in which heavy gains had been accumulated through the week, were sold in volume at falling prices. Golds were able to hold their ground fairly well, losing only .08 in the index while silvers were a bit heavy in the late proceedings. The miscellaneous mines index weakened 1.18 to 113.27. Volume was the heaviest of the month at 1,053,000 shares.

Selling of the base metals kept step with a drop of the metals on the New York market. Prices turned heavy around noon, rallied moderately in the last hour only to turn heavy again 10 minutes before the gong. Hudson Bay was the weakest, dropping 1-1/4 to 113.27. Castle, Bear and White Eagle were down slightly in the silvers. Eldorado firmed to 1.45 in the morning session under short covering but eased back to 1.38 to close unchanged.

Trading was a little heavier in the high-price golds with prices irregular.

Currency

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—The French franc was higher, sterling and the Canadian dollar lower, as trading was resumed in the foreign exchange markets today after the United States Thanksgiving Day holiday.

The franc moved up .00 1/2 of a cent to a closing rate of 6.59 cents, the best quotation since Nov. 6. The rally took place in the last hour following a vote of confidence in the Laval Government in the Chamber of Deputies at Paris.

The Canadian dollar extended its discount from 1 to 1-1/8 per cent while the pound, closing at \$4.93, showed a loss of 3-4 of a cent.

MONTREAL, Nov. 29.—No broad price changes were recorded on the Montreal open produce market in light turnover today. Butter was a shade easier but other lines held unchanged.

No 1 butter in carlots or less brought 25-3-4 cents a pound while small lots to retailers in carlots or less were 27 for solids and 28 for prints.

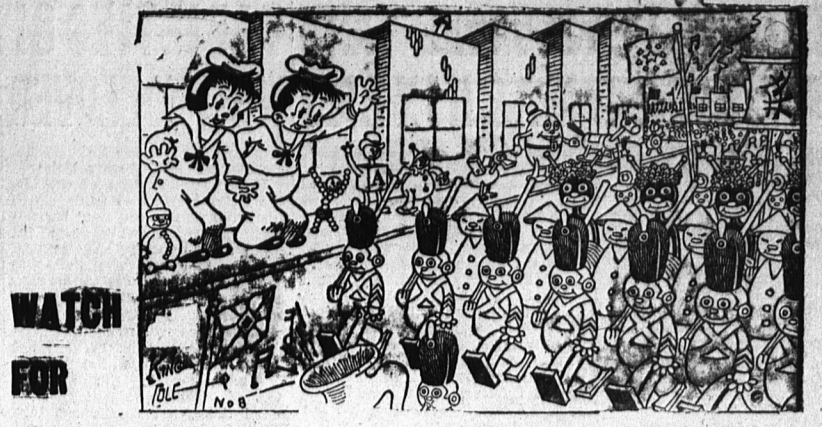
No 1 Ontario white cheese held at 11 cents a pound and colored at 11 1/2.

Col. A. E. Kirkpatrick of Toronto is given the medal for attempting to rescue a boy who got into difficulties in 18 feet of water at High Falls, Muskoka, Aug. 19, 1931. He brought the boy to shore and applied artificial respiration but unsuccessfully.

Bronze medals are also awarded as follows: Thomas Addicott, Glace Bay, N. S., for rescuing a woman from drowning Aug. 26; J. A. Sharpe of Lloydminster, Sask., and Vernon J. Laird of Maidstone, Sask., who on Oct. 24, 1934, were lowered down a well to bring up men overcome with gas.

AWARDED MEDALS For Life Saving

HAMILTON, Nov. 29.—(C.P.—) Every Canadian province is represented in the list of bronze medals and parchment certificates awarded by the investigating governors of the Royal Canadian Humane Association for deeds of heroism and presence of mind in saving life. Ten medals and 51 certificates are announced, seven to Ontario and Quebec residents.

Two medals and awarded posthumously and forwarded to surviving relatives of Mervin Somerville of Ottawa and William O'Brien of London, Ont. Mr. Somerville lost his life July 13 last after assisting his mate, Gordon Echlin, with whom he had been capsized from a racing shell into the choppy waters of Lake Deschênes. Mr. Echlin finally managed to get to shore but his companion was drowned before help came.

In the other posthumous award, William O'Brien lost his life attempting to rescue Noel Williams from drowning in Medway Creek, London, Ont., May 26. John N. MacKinnon also of London, who finally brought Williams to shore is awarded the bronze medal.

James W. Platt, a Canadian National swimmer of Hamilton, Ont., is cited for the bronze medal. While riding on the front platform of a locomotive Aug. 28 he reached down and threw out of harm's way a youngster who had tumbled and tripped in front of the moving train. The medal is awarded also to Peter MacDonald and Joseph Webb, both of Goderich, Ont., who on Aug. 1 rescued from drowning or being crushed to death a boy who jumped from the pier toward a boat and fell into the water.
