THE PRESS AND OUR TRANSPORTATION DIFFICULTIES.

The St. John Globe, which is an excellent Liberal newspaper, with some show of independence at times, comments upon The Guardian's recent references to Hon. Mr. Hazen as Minister of Marine and the prospects of his proving to be attentive to our needs and requirements. The Globe quite fairly quotes from our article and says that "fault cannot very well be found with this mode of stating the matter, and yet it seems to limit very much the duties of a Minister and his responsibilities." Then it goes on to say:

"How much can one section of the country get by having Mr. A. or Mr. B. as Minister from that section? what advantage will accrue to a particular political division if the Minister of Railways hails from that division instead of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries? Is the office of Minister of the Interior a better office to bring into a particular section of the country than the office of Postmaster General? A close observer of the working out of our political system cannot fail to note that there is a tendency to place upon this or the other Minister a personal responsibility for work for his section of the country apart from the general and joint responsibility which is upon the Ministry as a whole. However, if Prince Edward Island has grievances all its own after so many years of excellent Liberal rule, the hope may be ventured that whether they are in this particular department or not the Minister of Marine and Fisheries will give them his best attention."

It is quite true that the whole Cabinet is responsible for what is done or omitted in the way of administering our public affairs, but here we have found it difficult to get the late Cabinet interested in our transportation, and in that regard Prince Edward Island has grievances all its own even after the many years of "excellent Liberal rule" of which The Globe has spoken. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Mr. Fielding came here and addressed a large public meeting on the eve of the September election, but although they were courteously requested to give attention to our transportation

grievances, they declined to do so and were wholly silent in regard thereto. Mr. Borden and Mr. Hazen were more considerate. They talked freely of the matters complained of and promised redress whenever it should come within their power to give it. That is why we spoke hopefully of more sympathetic treatment at their hands than the Province has received during fifteen years past. And we would like The Globe and other leading newspapers of the Maritime Provinces also to take a sympathetic interest in our transportation difficulties with a view to help us and to help the new Government at Ottawa in providing a remedy. Many Canadian journals have spoken of "the tragedy" of the census, so far as this Province is concerned and the tragedy is closely connected with our transportation. This view of the case is supported by an excellent article from La Patrie a translation of which we reproduce elsewhere in this issue.

Our winter difficulties are notorious. Uncertain and circuitous as is the connection then, the cost is almost prohibitive. It costs ten cents per hundred pounds more to send a carload of oats 300 miles from a point on the Island Railway to Sydney than it costs to send a like carload 900 miles from Montreal to Sydney. This because we must pay three-short-haul rates. Yet in all the years of excellent Liberal rule we were unable to get the Laurier Government even to consider the matter. Twenty years ago Mr. Laurier, as he then was, told the people of this Province "the Tunnel to the mainland must be built if at all reasonably practicable," and that "the first thing was to have a survey made, which he was surprised had not been done long ago." But in fifteen years of power he did not have the survey made.

We complain of inexcusable neglect in these matters. We want to know whether the Tunnel is practicable at reasonable cost or not. We want a reasonable through freight rate for shipment of our products. These are not unreasonable demands. They are absolutely necessary to the growth and welfare of the Province and to prevent the tragedy of the census of 1911 being repeated ten years hence. Mr. Borden, Mr. Hazen and their colleagues will be abundantly justified in giving these matters their careful attention. Once our case comes before the Parliament and people of Canada we believe the importance and justice of immediate redress will be realized and conceded.

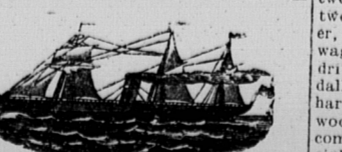
PROHIBITION IN MAINE.

The Guardian has an inquiry as to the present condition of the prohibitory law in the State of Maine, since the effort made to remove it from the constitution of the State by popular vote. Our information, while not as full as we could wish, that the result of the voting is still in doubt, pending an official summing up of the votes cast, which is not yet finished. There seems to be yet a prospect that constitutional prohibition may be sustained by a small majority.

Should it so turn out, it will be impossible for the State Legislature to repeal the law. If on the other hand the opponents of the law at the recent plebiscite should be found to have a majority, the prohibitory amendment will be struck out of the constitution, but the prohibitory law will remain on the statute book and be in operation until the Legislature shall repeal it. The prohibitory law, first enacted in 1851, was not embodied in the State constitution till 1884. The one important result of making prohibition an article of the constitution was to place it beyond the power of the Legislature to repeal the law.

It is said the leaders of the revolt in China are confident of success and hope to establish a republic in the ancient Empire. The success of such a movement is not greatly to be desired. Asiatic people especially seem better fitted for monarchical than for republican rule. But the people of China have suffered long under the despotic and corrupt domi-

nation of a dynasty alien to the great majority, and it will not be surprising if the existing Government should be overthrown.

The candidature of Prof. McPhail in Belfast, altogether apart from his political affiliations, is a matter of more than common interest. He has been long engaged in educational work and is at the same time deeply engrossed in all that makes for progress and improvement in our great staple industry of farming. A man of ideas and culture, a native of the district, and an enthusiastic agriculturist in one, ought to be a distinct acquisition to the Legislature at the present time.

Out of our losses as a Province some gain may come. The census has served to direct the attention of the press east and west to our loss of population, our long-continued disabilities, the broken faith of the Dominion, and the necessity for an immediate remedy.

A short time ago attention was directed to a new appliance, the invention of Wright Brothers, for securing the stability of aeroplanes while flying. Now the word comes that Orville Wright, while testing the new invention, narrowly escaped death by having his machine overturned in the air. So many fatalities have occurred in flying that the world has grown appalled by the slaughter and impatient to have the aeroplane perfected to the point of comparative safety. That may, or may not be possible.

Three weeks hence come the bye-elections in Belfast and Fort Augustus. They come at what may be an unfavorable season, and the general conviction is that they should have been held months ago during the abundant good-weather. But if in the meantime a statement of the public accounts down to the end of the last fiscal year is made public it will afford some compensation.

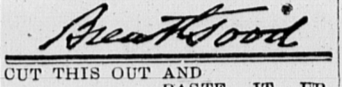

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert notices of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks vertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, nookeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or the Rural Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or table purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable; or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order.

For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., are chargeable if an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even tho a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Verases accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable for but once in either Morning Daily or Rural Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.

The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided. 3-16drtf
