MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Estimates For the Year Passed—Increase of Tax to Provide Sinking Fund For Water Debentures—Increase of Salary to Magistrate and Grants Criticized.

A special meeting of the City Council was held last night for the purpose of passing the estimates. Councillor Hooper, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the following list of estimated expenditures:

Estimated Revenue \$58,000.00 Estimated Surplus \$ 206.70

In making a statement regarding the estimates Councillor Hooper said that it was the duty of the Council to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of the Waterworks Debentures, about which the Water Commissioners had written the City Council, and which had been before the Board at the last meeting.

Councillor McDonald said he was sure it would surprise citizens to know that their taxes had not increased, when surpluses had been declared for the past two years. It was not clear why the increase was made. There is a general opinion among citizens that there was a deficit of four or five thousand dollars last year.

EIGHT KILLED AND MORE HURT

By Train Derailed on Entering Louisville Station Yesterday

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 28.—(Special)—Eight were killed and twenty-two injured today by the derailment of four cars of a passenger train on the Louisville and Nashville Railway as it was entering Union Station here.

JUMPED FROM TRAIN AND DIED

HAMILTON, May 28.—The outing of the 61st Highlanders at Windsor had a sad ending. This morning as the boys were returning to the city, while passing through Dundas, Corporal Edwin W. Briggs, whose home is in Dundas, jumped from the train while travelling twenty miles an hour and fell beneath the wheel. Both legs were cut off near the trunk and the unfortunate man died before he reached the city.

A MORAL WAVE HITS LOUISVILLE

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 27.—Louisville observed the Sabbath rigidly today. All saloons were closed except one kept by a Jew who observed Saturday as Sabbath. He was arrested but was allowed to continue selling through the day, doing a lively business as the news spread. Besides the saloons, all barber shops, bowling alleys, billiard halls, theatres, groceries and in fact everything except hotels, drug stores and railway and street car lines were closed.

JAP COLONY FOR SOUTHWEST TEXAS

GALVESTON, Tex., May 25.—Yokum interests have perfected plans for the colonization of several thousand Japanese in Southwest Texas. Five tracts of land aggregating 520,000 acres have been acquired in Hidalgo, Cameron, Nueces and Zapata Counties. Two prominent Japanese are now in their native country preparing to bring out one hundred families.

MORE CASES OF TYPHOID FEVER

ST. JOHN, May 28.—(Special)—Two new cases of typhoid were reported to the Board of Health this morning making a total of 39 cases at the present time. There have been no seizures of milk from Bloomfield since Saturday but the officials continue to watch the trains.

RECONSTRUCTION OF THE MINISTRY

Talked of at St. Petersburg, but Cannot Satisfy the Duma—Government Seeking to Pacify the Peasantry by Giving Millions of Acres of Crown Lands.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 28.—(Special)—Rumors of a change in the Government are everywhere prevalent. It is persistently reported that former Finance Minister Shipoff has been summoned to a conference with the Emperor.

Government, however liberal, will receive the slightest consideration unless the demanded concessions are made. No reconstruction of the ministry, and no partial concessions in regard to the land question can break the existing dead lock. The Czar and his reactionist advisers seek to temporise, but there is not room for a Parliament and a reactionist ministry in Russia now.

LOAD KITCHENER DOING GOOD WORK

CALCUTTA, May 28.—The Allahabad Pioneer says:—"Lord Kitchener has now been here three and a half years in the country, and the last year has witnessed a great advance in his relations with the Indian Army, the fruit of closer knowledge. The sympathetic tone of his recent speech on the occasion of the budget discussion has been marked and appreciated. The native ranks, who undoubtedly felt the strain imposed on them by the constant demands of training on modern lines, are becoming aware that there is a relaxation of the pressure."

TROUBLE ABOUT GIVING REWARD

VANCOUVER, May 28.—The Canadian Pacific has intimated to the Mounted Police, who secured the train robbers, that the \$5,000 offered by the company for their capture will be given to Sergt. Wilson and his men. The British Columbia Government is sore at the interference of the police in their territory and will give the \$1,000 reward it offered to Constable Fernie, who first tracked the robbers and then called upon the Mounted Police to assist him. The Dominion Government reward of \$5,000 cannot be accepted by the Mounted Police and will go to the British Columbia police.

ZIONISM MAY INVADE CANADA

CHICAGO, Ill., May 27.—Plans are being laid by Wilbur Glenn Voliva and his followers for a new Zion which will be established if the United States courts interfere seriously with the present status of Zion City community. The rapidly developing agricultural district of Western Canada is suggested as a good point for the location of a community.
