THE BLACK CALF BORN

OLD LEGEND AFFECTING FERRERS FAMILY IS FULFILLED.

Noted White Cattle of Chartley—It 1773 Disaster Followed the Appearance of Black Offspring and Will Now Be Repeated—The Estate Is for Sale and Will Probably Pass from the Ferrers Family Forever.

The name of Ferrers is among the very oldest in English records, and this, if for no other reason, gives exceptional interest to the approaching sale of the Staffordshire estate of Chartley, which has now for centuries descended with the blood of the Ferrers family.

At the Conquest William helped himself bountifully to the acres of Staffordshire, and to the other counties, but divided the considerable residue among five of his prime lords of whom Henry de Ferrers was one. Moors and fertile valleys, hills and deer forests were included in the Ferrers estates, which reached at one time from Tamworth on the Devon to Newcastle in the Potteries. Chartley, in the first allotment, went to the Earl of Chester, who, with that potent and brave viceroy Roger de Montgomery, pretty well shared between them all the northern half of the Plantagenet times it was joined to the lands of the Ferrers, then ennobled as Earls of Derby.

Chartley Castle was already built, and its new lords began to make history. They did this seriously to their cost, by supporting Simon de Montfort in his rebellion, which led to the imposition by Henry III. of the stupendous fine of £50,000 on the then head of the family. The fine was a gift to the King's son Edmund, and in spite of supplication on every side he was imprisoned, and set him on a black palfrey to carry him back to the poor brace of manors which alone remained to him after the liquidation of his enormous penalty.

By and by male heirs failed the family, and a Devereux possessed Chartley through his wife. The Devereux were made Earls of Essex which brings us to that fascinating madcap Robert, who so fatally abused his power with Queen Elizabeth. In his time Mary Queen of Scots suffered at Chartley one of her many spells of imprisonment in English houses, and, as report tells us, "made a bed" there; that is to say, embroidered a bed-cover. She was not confined in the castle, which was then as now a mere ruin on a mound, but in the mansion house near to it, and in a depressing sojourn it must have been for her, if one may assume that the present thickets of sombre yews, firs, and hollies about the building is an inheritance kind from the sixteenth century. Save for the memory of the mansion house, interesting. Just a solid, sober, mellowed old English home such as our fox-hunting ancestors were content to sleep and drink in after their outside pleasures. But behind it stretch the hundreds of acres of rolling moor still standing in the "mighty large parks" of Leland's day—the burrow of many a rabbit and the haunt of the decayed remnant of that herd of white cattle which have for centuries made Chartley as famous as Chillingham in the north. Little need be said about the later fortunes and misfortunes of the family. By marriage Chartley passed to the Shirleys, who were oppressed by Cromwell as Royalists, and later rewarded by Charles II. with the revival of the name of Ferrers. The Earl Ferrers of Queen Anne's time had fifteen sons and twelve daughters, which tended to impoverishment. His grandson, the notorious Laurence Earl Ferrers, of the Newgate Calendar, left a sad blot on the name in that murder of his steward (at Stanton in Leicestershire) which brought him to Tyburn in 1760, attired in white satin and silver, and riding in a landau drawn by six horses. Horace Walpole's description of the execution is one of the best things in his "Letters," and it is worth remembering that here for the first time in England a sinking platform was used, devised by the family that their kinsman might not swing off from a cart like a plectrum culprit. The drop of eight inches given by this device was not enough, however, and four minutes elapsed before the death.

Of the wild cattle of Chartley scarcely more than a dozen survive, and these, to be seen, must be approached (especially for photographic purposes) somewhat carefully under guidance of the Chartley gamekeeper. Inbreeding seems to have played havoc with them, and it is to combat the effects of their sterility that the bold step has been taken of introducing a black bull into the pure white herd. Later, of course, the color will be bred back to the original white, but that will be a work of time. Meanwhile one wonders what the mediaeval lords of Chartley would say if they could see the black calves now encouraged on the estate. For such a birth in the herd was considered an omen of the darkest kind, importing immediate death or disaster in the family. The legend began to be respected in 1322, after the battle of Burton Bridge between Edward II. and his revolted barons with a Ferrers among them. A black calf being born that year at Chartley and the second downfall of the house ensuing this was imputed to the black quadruped (which was infamously killed) and the pure white herd. Later, of course, the color will be bred back to the original white, but that will be a work of time.
