"Sell-And-Switch"

During recent months dishonest security vendors, operating from Montreal and Toronto, have been particularly active, and another caution against the methods of irresponsible vendors of questionable stocks is timely, says Better Business Bureau. "Tipster" sheets, lurid literature and high-pressure telegrams have all played their part in bringing in victims, but the favorite approach is the long distance telephone call. "Sell-and-switch" operators are known to have been imported from the United States. They are experts in their line. Under assumed names they introduce themselves over the telephone as representing a brokerage house with an impressive name but brief existence. The usual procedure is to tell the prospective victim that the firm is desirous of building up a permanent clientele. Mention is made of some listed mining stock and the "client" is told that the brokerage firm has inside information that a pool is being formed or other important bullish news. He is pressed to buy before the certain advance takes place. The stock discussed is invariably that of some corporation in which the prospect is already a stockholder, or else some listed stock which is a market favorite. The prospect is told that in order to obtain him as a client, he is to be given the opportunity of buying the recommended stock on a 50 per cent margin. All too often the introductory offer is accepted, and a cheque sent. Within a few days, if the price of the security drops, his price

they "switch" it to the public at an unaccountable profit to themselves. One such "sell-and-switch" concern, the Stock & Bond Investment Co., Ltd., had its registration as broker cancelled in the Province of Quebec by the Provincial Authorities some time ago, and the tenure of these firms is usually short, as there is no effort to treat the clients honestly. None of these "sell-and-switch" operations would succeed if the potential victim would make even the most cursory investigation of the short business history of the firms and stocks offered for sale.

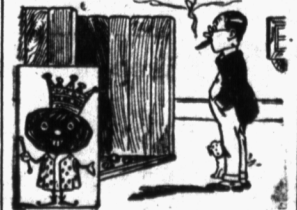
