**SUICIDE BECAUSE OF WOMAN'S REBUFE**

PARRSBORO, August 9.—William Henwood, aged about 18, who has been working at stevedoring in Parrsboro Roads, attempted suicide at West Bay on Sunday afternoon by shooting himself in the breast. The bullet passed through his lung just above his heart and lodged back of his shoulder blade. Doctors Rand and McKenzie were summoned from Parrsboro and extracted the bullet, but thought he could not recover. He is still alive this evening, and it is thought now he may pull through. The cause of his act is supposed to be the refusal of a young woman to go walking with him.

**NEGRO ASSOCIATIONS TO FIGHT CONSUMPTION**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The plan for the organization of negro anti-tuberculosis leagues in the various states, proposed recently by the United States public health and marine hospital service has been met with a quick response.

The movement is mainly a campaign of education intended to check the progress of tuberculosis among the negroes, where the disease is said to be especially prevalent threatening the race with declination and proving a serious menace to the whites with whom they come in contact. The movement has been taken up actively by the National Association of colored teachers.

**SHOOT MIDDY AS HUMAN TORPEDO**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Disregarding absolutely the danger of death that threatened him, and wishing only to demonstrate for the benefit of officers and men who go to sea in submarines which it is possible to escape from them in case they sink, Midshipman Kenneth Whiting, in command of the submarine Porpoise, now in Manila, it is learned today had himself ejected from the vessel while it rested on the bottom of the sea and rose safely to the surface.

Whiting's feat is regarded as all the more heroic because he refused to ask any of his subordinates to undertake his dangerous experiment, but, being in command, deemed it proper for himself to do it. Accordingly, the Porpoise was lowered to the bottom of the bay, near Cavite, and arrangements made for the experiment.

When the vessel was resting on the mud at the bottom, between sixty and seventy feet deep, he crawled in to a torpedo tube. The end of the tube was closed or opened on the outside by a port, which is moved by powerful machinery from within the boat. There is a great pressure under the water against the port cover, and it takes a tremendous amount of power to force it up. When it opens there is a great rush of water. There is a great rush of water. The rush is so powerful that Whiting and drowning him before he could even escape from the tube.

Whiting got within the tube and obtained a hold of the port. Inside the officers turned on the power, the port swinging open. Whiting holding on for his life, swung out with it and with powerful strokes swam clear of the suction of the rushing water. Then he shot up to the surface.

Immediately after the opening of the port the officers raised the vessel. For a second they gazed around, filled with anxiety for Whiting. A few feet away they saw him heading for the vessel. They cheered and dragging him aboard. The feat is regarded as one of the most remarkable ever attempted in the navy.

The experiment demonstrates that men in a sunken submarine can be saved, providing, of course, the machinery is not disarranged. But it also demonstrates, too, that one of the men must die. Some one must remain behind to keep the machinery in operation while the others make the flight through the tube.
