Many Visitors At Technical School Last Evening

The Agricultural and Technical School was visited last evening by about five hundred citizens and out-of-town people, who showed great interest in the work being carried on by the various departments under the supervision of Mr. Vernon Crockett.

The household science class, under the supervision of Miss Helen Mathieson, assisted by Miss Evelyn Windsor, attracted great attention and many enthusiastic comments were passed on the splendid work being done. Classes in cooking, dressmaking and millinery were in progress, and there was a very fine exhibition of work.

In the motor mechanics department, under Mr. Harry Whitlock, the repairing of cars, tractors and gasoline engines was going on. These come into the shop in the fall and are overhauled and sent out in working condition in the spring. Six cars and four tractors were completely overhauled and repaired during the season.

In the wood-working department, under Mr. H. E. Waugh, the students were seen at work on models of farm implements and other useful articles, which are taken home at the end of the term.

Of particular interest to the delegates attending the Farmers' meetings were milking tests, conducted by Mr. J. W. Shaw, who is teaching the live stock and field crops classes, and the dairy department, under Inspector F. T. Morrow, where the cheese and butter plant, pasteurizer, churn and other machinery driven by motor power were in operation.

The Poultry Show was not forgotten and there were always num-

bers of interested visitors in this department during the evening. The poultry judge, Mr. J. W. Clark, of Grainsville, Ontario, who has been judging here for the past five or six years commented very favorably on this year's exhibit, which pleased him both in quality and number. Mr. John Whitlock the efficient superintendent, is on the job, as usual, and deserves credit for the way the display is arranged.

## Meeting of Radio Club Held Last Night

The annual meeting of the Radio Club of this city was held last evening in the room of the Radio Supply Depot. Thirty-five Radio enthusiasts were present and the meeting proved an interesting and profitable one.

On retirement of the original officers of the Club the following were elected for the ensuing year: President, Keith S. Rogers, Vice President, Mr. Herbert Vanderstine; Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. Angus D. McMaisters.

A committee was appointed to deal with the matter of increasing the membership of the club until, if possible, everyone who operates a Radio Receiver in this city will be a member. Another committee was appointed to deal with entertainment and instruction at the regular meetings to be held during the balance of the season. A technical committee was also appointed to deal with interference such as caused by faults in Telephone and electric light and power installation.

Considerable information was given regarding the work of the various club officers and committees during the past year along the line of bettering receiving conditions in this city and also regarding the success of the Club Broadcasting station. This station which is jointly operated by Mr. Walter Bourke and Major Rogers at their own expense, has already been heard all over this Province and in addition has received numerous letters and cards from the neighboring Provinces of N. S. and N. B. stating their appreciation of the programmes.

A talk given about a month ago from this station in the interests of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association, by Major Rogers, was heard in Pictou and Colchester counties and as far as the Annapolis Valley. A continuation of this service with increased power is suggested and if carried out will result in bringing an increase in the tourist traffic to the island.

who are earnestly longing for what came so easily to her. What modern people call a revival began at once. We are told in the simple language of the Gospel record that "many believed on Him because of the word of the woman." They had not seen Jesus yet. He was up by the well. They were down in the village. She was an ignorant woman, of formerly a sinful life. But there is the record of the wonderful result of her simple witnessing—they believed on Jesus because of the word of that woman. There is only one way to account for such results. Only the Holy Spirit speaking through her lips could have produced them. She had commenced drinking of the living water of which Jesus had been talking to her, and now already the rivers were flowing out to others.

What Jesus did with her, He longs to do with you, and far more, if you will let Him; though his plan for using you may be utterly different from the one He had for her, and so the particular results different. Now let me ask you very frankly why have we not all such power for our Master as she? The Master's plan is plain. He said "ye shall have power." But so many of us do not have it? Why not? Well, possibly some of us are like Nicodemus—there is no power because of timidity, cowardice, fear of what they will think, or say. Possibly some of us are in the same condition spiritually that Lazarus was in physically. We are tied up tight, hands and feet and face. Some sin, some compromise, some hush up their inner voice, some keep silent. Some little thing, you may say. Humph! as though anything could be little that is wrong! Sin is never little!

## A CLOGGED CHANNEL

Out in Colorado they tell of a little town nestled down at the foot of some hills—a sleepy-hollow village. You remember the rainfall is slight out there, and they depend much upon irrigation, but some enterprising citizens ran a pipe up the hills to a lake of clear, sweet water. As a result the town enjoyed a plentiful supply of water the year round without being dependent upon the doubtful rainfall. And the population increased and the place had quite a western boom. One morning the housewives turned the water spigots, but no water came. There was some sputtering. There is apt to be noise when there is nothing there. The men climbed the hill. There was the lake full as the hills. They examined around the pipes as well as possible, but could find no cause no break. Try as they might, they could find no cause for the stoppage. And as days grew into weeks, people commenced moving away again, the grass grew in the streets, and the prosperous town was going back to its old sleepy condition when one day one of the officials received a note. It was poorly written, with bad spelling and grammar, but the men could read less about writing grammar than just then. It said in effect: "If you'll jes pull the plug out of the pipe about eight inches from the top you'll get all the water you want." Up they started for the top of the hill, and examined the pipe, found the plug which some vicious tramp had inserted. Not a very big plug—just big enough to fill the pipe. It is surprising how large a reservoir of water can be held back by a how small a plug. Out came the plug; down came the water freely; by and by back came prosperity again.

Why is there such a lack of power in our lives? The reservoir up yonder is full of overflow, with clear, sweet, life-giving water. And here all around us the earth is so dry, so thirsty, cracked open—huge cracks like dumb mouths asking mutely for what we should give. And the connecting pipes between the reservoir above and the land below are clogged there. Why then do not the refreshing waters come rushing down? The answer is very plain. You know why. There is a plug in the pipe. Something in us clogging up the channel and nothing can get through. How shall we have power, abundant, life-giving, sweetening our own lives, and changing those we touch? The answer is easy for me to give—it will be much harder for you all to do—pull out the plug. Get out the thing that you know is hindering.

## Sheep Breeder

(Continued from Page 1)

The P. E. Island Sheep Breeders Association in 1923 marketed for any one who wished to avail themselves of the opportunity of selling their wool on a graded, cooperative basis. The results as shown in the table below are an evidence that the producer is making a profit not only through the higher price but also from the fact that he is giving more attention to the preparation of the wool and to the quality of the wool marketed.

In 1923 the total quantity of wool marketed was something over 35,000 lbs., a slight decrease from 1922 and yet about thirty more patrons contributed wool to the Association. The smaller quantity received is attributed to the smaller flocks of sheep now found in the Province. In very few cases did we receive any large quantity of wool from any one farmer. The amount of wool received according to grade was: Medium Staple 5,364 lbs., Low Staple 15,394 lbs., Low Staple 7,777 lbs., Coarse 644 lbs. The balance was made up of the poorer grades. A great many cotted fleeces were received, amounting to 2,208 lbs. These of course sold at a less price and reduced our average considerably. The prices paid in the last four years for the four grades of wool which includes the bulk of the wool handled were as follows:

1920	1921	1922	1923
Medium	40c	17½c	26c
L. Medium	30c	12½c	23c
L. Staple	25c	11½c	15c
Coarse	18c	7c	13c

The prices show a steady increase for the last three years, for while not up to the price in 1920, nevertheless, all except the highest grade, been approaching the prices received in that year.

Wool was received at the Charlottetown Grading Station beginning the last of June, continuing up to the time of grading. As soon as the wool was graded an advance of 15c per lb. was made to the patrons, the balance being paid as soon as possible after sales were made. The highest prices for wool were received about the time of shearing, but these prices did not hold long, and buying at the high price stopped before our wool was graded.

The Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers who market the wool for our Association and other Associations throughout the Dominion were therefore obliged to hold the wool for some considerable time which resulted in sales at a higher price than if the wool had been offered immediately after grading was completed. The sales at the later date netted considerable higher prices and the Association was able to make its final settlement in December.

With regard to the handling of wool by the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers and to their opinion for the outlook of the future, we will quote the following paragraph from a letter received recently from the Manager:

"Referring to the quality of wool handled, we find that uniformly from all parts of Canada, we have had an increase in the number of chippers and that if the average individual shipment from each of our shippers in 1923 had been as large as in the years previous to 1922, we would have handled our usual quantity of wool. We find that throughout our list of shippers there has been a decided decrease in the average individual shipment of wool, plainly showing smaller farm flocks shorn in 1923. From reports reaching us, we believe that the situation has turned the corner in this respect, and we would anticipate a very healthy increase in the sheep population of Canada in 1924. This logically should be the case inasmuch as sheep husbandry today is looked upon as the most profitable branch of the live stock industry.

"Concerning the outlook for 1924 the raw wool position is sound. There has been a general decrease in the number of sheep in the world. Surplus stocks of wool held by BAWRA which for so long a period had a decided influence on prices, have now been further reduced from 913,000 bales at the end of December, 1922 to 289,000 bales at November 30th, 1923. The end of this wool is in sight early this year. While there will be fluctuations in values, yet any lowering of wool values in 1924, is not looked for, the wool position being strong from every viewpoint. Therefore, with anything like normal consumption of wool, prices should be well maintained."
