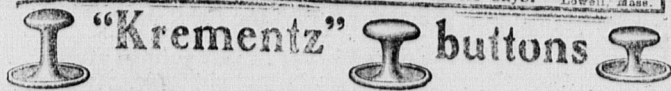

Her remains followed by a large concourse of relatives and friends were laid to rest beside those of her husband in the church yard at Alexandria. The services at the home and grave were conducted by Rev. D. R. Chouen. The pallbearers were Richard Carver, Wm. Judson, Charles Mutch, Peter Jakeman, Patrick Duffly, Edward Wood.

671 KNOTS IN DAY'S STEAMING

NEW YORK, Feb. 18—Word of the breaking of another ocean record by the steamer Mauretania was received here yesterday in a wireless message stating that the big turbiner in the day's run ending at noon Monday, on her voyage from Liverpool and Queenstown to New York had made six hundred and seventy one knots. The record for the best previous day's run was held by the Lusitania, by her run of six hundred and fifty knots on Aug. 17 last. The Mauretania's average speed during her record day's run was 28.21 knots.
