SAY LEIPZIG IS A CRIPPLED SHIP

GERMAN CRUISER BELIEVED LIKELY TO DISMANTLE UNTIL END OF WAR.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 4.—There has been a relaxation of the activities of the three cruisers using Esquimault as a base since it was officially announced that the German cruiser Leipzig no longer was a menace to commerce. It is thought in British Columbia that the Leipzig may enter an American port and dismantle until the end of the war.

The Leipzig had been reported sinking, when she held up the American tank steamer off Cape Mendocino, California.

THE NAVY'S NEW WEAPON
The Huge Power and Range of the Fifteen-Inch Gun

Germany's inferiority in regard to naval armament will be even more marked in a few weeks—when the 15-inch gun makes its appearance on two new British Super-Dreadnoughts—than it is at present.

We already have on duty, in the North Sea (points out Mr. Archibald Hurd, in the "Daily Telegraph") thirteen ships mounting a gun—the 13.5-inch weapon—which is still without its equal in any of the navies of the world. In October next two ships—the "Queen Elizabeth" and the "Warspite"—are due for delivery. They mount an even more deadly weapon—the new 15-inch gun.

The First Lord of the Admiralty recently gave the nation the Admiralty's view of the triumphs of the British naval ordnance authorities. Speaking of the efficiency of the new gun over the 13.5-inch weapon, he said:

When the first of these guns was tried it yielded ballistic results which vindicated, with what is to the lay mind marvelous exactitude, the minute calculations of the designer. It reproduces all the virtues of the 13.5-inch gun on a larger scale, and it is the most accurate at all ranges that we have ever had. As it is never pressed to its full capacity by exceptionally long-lived gun.

Its power may be measured by the fact that whereas the 13.5-inch gun hurls a 1,400 lb. projectile, a 15-inch gun discharges a projectile of nearly a ton in weight and can hurl this immense mass of metal ten or twelve miles. That is to say, there has been an increase of rather more than 30 per cent.—I am purposely vague on this point—in the weight of the projectile for an addition of 1½ in. to the calibre.

This increase in the capacity of the shell produces results in far greater proportion in its explosive power, and the high explosive charge the 15-inch gun can carry through and get inside the thickest armor afloat is very nearly half as large again in the 15-inch gun as was the charge in the 13.5-inch.

It is interesting to recall that even though the war should last until next spring, when two more British ships with 15-inch guns are due for delivery, Germany will still possess no ships carrying a heavier weapon than
