Belvedere Golf Links Scene Of Great Activity

Sixty-One Golfers Representing Principal Maritime Cities And Towns Tee Off In Opening Day's Play Of Annual Senior Meet.

Belvedere Golf Links, one of the finest eighteen hole courses in Eastern Canada, was a bee hive of activity yesterday, the occasion being the eighth annual meet of the Maritime Senior Golf Association.

Golfers, non participants and enthusiasts of the game, making up an aggregate of almost two hundred, crowded the magnificent course, grounds and club house during the day, which gave one the impression that a Canadian amateur open event was in progress.

A feature of the day was a hole in one made by N. C. Rodger of Amherst who negotiated number 2 hole in the lone stroke while playing a friendly match with Senator Robinson of Moncton and Hon. F. B. McCurdy of Halifax.

Allan Stewart Ch'town Star Eliminated At Newcastle After Spectacular Match.

(Canadian Press) NEWCASTLE, N. B., Aug. 15.—All first round matches in men's and ladies singles and junior male singles were played in the New Brunswick open tennis championship tournament, which commenced here today on the courts of the Newcastle Tennis Club. The most outstanding match of the day's play was that in which Philip Ganong, St. Stephen, N. B., playing in his first major tournament, thrilled the gallery by a spectacular victory over Allan Stewart, Charlottetown, P. E. I. ace and one of the Island's foremost players. It was a bitter struggle, with Ganong making a strong comeback after dropping the first set to his more experienced opponent. Stewart staged a clever rally to overcome an important lead in the third set, but lost out at 7-5. Ganong promises to be one of the finds of the tournament.

A disappointing situation arose in the match between Miss Gertrude Keating, Moncton, N.B., and Miss Helen McKay, of Pampdenac, N.B., both clever players, who staged a pretty exhibition until Miss McKay was forced to default on account of the terrific heat with the score 5-2 against her in the second set. The showing of Ronald Ralston, of the Pampdenac Club, in defeating J. L. McKenna, of Rothesay, N.B., in straight sets with the loss of only one game, won the attention of the gallery.
