One Thousand Strike Ballots Issued

(Canadian Press) PORT ARTHUR, July 18.—One thousand strike ballots were being distributed among Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railway stevedores, freight clerks and other dock workers last night.

The men who will cast their vote before the week-end are members of the International Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, freight handlers, express and station employees with headquarters in Indianapolis.

Timber Workers Will End Strike

(Canadian Press) PORT ARTHUR, Ont., July 18.—Striking timber workers of the Thunder Bay district voted today on a proposal to end the disagreement with contractors which has kept camps partially idle for three weeks.

Result of the vote, it was stated, would not be known for a day or two. In the meantime contractors claimed that regardless of the vote they were about ready to consider the strike as at an end.

More than 1,000 timber workers were called out by the Industrial Workers Union demanding increased wages. The proposal voted on today includes no general wage increase apart from a promise of contractors to give special consideration to cases where men are required to work in thin timber.

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 18.—Surgery and radiation combined have produced the best results in treatment of mouth cancers at the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, Dr. Cecil E. Kinney, of Halifax, told more than 80 doctors who met here for the 55th annual meeting of the New Brunswick Medical Society.

Statements that smokers were more susceptible to cancer than non-smokers were supported by some of the doctors, and disagreed with by others.

VACCINE USE IN HATCHING EGGS

(VICTORIA, July 18.—Dr. C. C. Hoeftin, formerly of Bern University, Switzerland, created intense interest this afternoon among eighty delegates to the Pacific Northwest Veterinary Medical Association when he demonstrated his new technique of introducing non-specific vaccine into hatching eggs.

Dr. Hoeftin drilled holes in eggs with a small trocar, introduced the vaccine with a hypodermic syringe and then sealed up the orifice with cotton.

Results of the treatment, he pointed out, would be far-reaching. Fowl and animals would grow to a healthy maturity, free from practically all disease.

Dr. Hoeftin believed it would be possible to develop a vaccine for human beings which would ensure them reaching maturity with resistance built up to avoid all ordinary diseases.

Liberal Apology Runs Counter To Previous Liberal Claims Alibi

Highly significant to the electors in the present campaign was the statement of Mr. A. E. MacLean, M.P., at the Kinkora meeting Monday night, that this Province would not receive its new subsidy increase "until a Liberal government is in power."

The statement is significant because it exactly reflects Liberal incredulity with regard to the whole question of our subsidy claims.

A few minutes afterwards, on the same platform, Premier MacMillan was able to inform the Liberal parliamentary representative that A CHECK FOR \$75,000, REPRESENTING ONE-HALF THE INCREASE WHICH THE PROVINCE WILL OBTAIN THIS YEAR, HAS ALREADY BEEN RECEIVED.

Now let us examine the Liberal attitude as reflected in the letter in Monday's Patriot attributed to Mr. W. M. Lea. The claim is there repeated that failure of the other Maritime Provinces to co-operate with this Province before the Audit Board in May, 1930, resulted in this Province not receiving a subsidy increase, there and then, of \$438,000.

How does this tally with Premier Saunders' statement in the Patriot on January 25, 1930, that the Audit Board had been appointed specially "TO MAKE FINAL ADJUSTMENT OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND SUBSIDY CLAIMS"?

The shoe, of course, is on the other foot. IT WAS THROUGH THE POLITICAL MANOEUVRING OF LIBERAL GOVERNMENTS IN THIS PROVINCE AND AT OTTAWA THAT OUR CLAIMS WERE NOT SETTLED IN 1923. Figured on a basis of the increase obtained by the MacMillan Government last year, this represents a loss in subsidy payment of \$750,000. Figured on the basis of Mr. Lea's brief before the Audit Board, it represents a loss of \$2,190,000. Figured on the basis of the brief Mr. Lea published in the Liberal press on Jan. 21, 1930, IT REPRESENTS A LOSS OF \$16,860,825 PLUS \$200,000 "CASH SUBSIDY" WHICH THE PRESENT LIBERAL LEADER INCLUDED IN HIS GARGANTUAN REQUEST.
