Rangers, Black Hawks, Canadiens Winners Of Last Night's N. H. L. Games

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Swinging along in their victorious stride, the New York Rangers held to a tie for first place with the Chicago Black Hawks in the American Division of the National Hockey League tonight as they turned back the Toronto Maple Leafs 3-0, before a sell out crowd of 15,885 in Madison Square Gardens.

The Rangers jumped into an early lead and then engaged the Leafs in a battle royal in the third period in which Red Horner, O. Huck Conacher and Earl Selbert each drew major penalties for engaging in scuffles.

MURDOCK Murray Murdoch and Lynn Patrick combined for the first Rangers goal the former beating George Hainsworth. After 12 minutes and 14 seconds of play, he took a pass from Frank Boucher deep in Rangers territory, evaded the Leafs defence and beat Hainsworth with a terrific drive.

LENNIPS The final goal came off Paul Thompson's stick, on a pass from Doc Romnes. The desperate Wings, in a five-man drive, were caught down the ice when Thompson lashed in the final minute of play.
