Brooks Win And Draw To Drop Half Game Back Of St. Louis Cardinals

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—(AP)—Baseball's show team, the Brooklyn Dodgers, staged two weird games for 27,516 home fans today and came out of their Labor Day doubleheader with Boston Braves with a 15-inning 6-5 triumph and a six-inning 2-2 tie which will have to be played off tomorrow.

A jittery moment by shortstop Peeewe Reese provided the tie game, which darkness abbreviated, and let St. Louis Cardinals creep half a game ahead of the Dodgers in their torrid National League pennant drive.

St. Louis 83 won 45 lost 648 pct. Brooklyn 83 won 46 lost 643 pct.

The opener, in which each team used 17 players, including six pitchers for Boston and three for Brooklyn, was climaxed, after more than four hours of light-to-the-vest play, by Dolph Camilli's fifth inning long single to left with the bases crammed—scoring pinch runner Pete Coscarart with the winning run.

Fat Fred Fitzsimmons should have taken the nightcap with a shutout, but he did not figure on the inept play of his jitterbug shortstop who failed to come up with a fifth-inning throw from Billy Herman, and thus let the Braves get two unearned runs on two hits—their total for the game.

At St. Louis, the Cardinals ran their latest winning streak to seven games by sweeping a pair of games from Pittsburgh, 5-3 and 6-3.

A paid attendance of 34,812—the largest since Aug. 13, 1939—jammed Sportsman's Park to see the double victory and the great work of the Cardinals rookie southpaw, Ernie White and Howard Pollet.

Pollet, up from Houston of the Texas League less than two weeks, scored his third triumph against one setback.

NEWARK, N.J., Sept. 1.—(AP)—Newark Bears mathematically clinched the 1941 International League pennant today by defeating Jersey City Giants in the first game of a doubleheader, 4-3. The visitors turned the tables on the champions in the nightcap, winning by the same score to gain an even break.
