Canada Has Army In Field For First Time

Faces Some Of Toughest Troops In German Army Reports Say.

Nazis Lose 135 Tanks
LONDON, Aug. 8 — (Tues- day) — (CP) — Allied planes knocked out 135 German tanks launching a counter-attack south of Mortain Mon- day, it was announced today.

Nascopie At Churchill

CHURCHILL, Aug. 7 — (CP) — The icebreaker Nascopie arrived here Sunday with the annual eastern Arctic patrol. She was two weeks earlier than last year. The vessel, carrying supplies for trading posts and stations of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the eastern Arctic, was com- manded by Capt. Thomas Smellie. Each year the Nascopie visits trading posts and stations of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the eastern Arctic, bring- ing their stores for the following month. In 1941, as a precau- tionary measure, the ship carried supplies for two years in case the normal annual visits impossi- ble to make its trip as usual, but one post could not be reached— Port Ross on Baffin Island. The ship will go back through Hudson Strait and around Baffin Island to open up Port Ross again. It is hoped by arriving earlier the ship will be able to get through ice.

War Situation Last Night

There was more than a hint of desperation in the first heavy German counter-attack to strike American lines in France since the break-through into Brittany and the Loire Valley. It came too late to have done more than slow up the many-fanged blitz even had it reached its indicated objective, the Avranches gateway. The German thrust, probably intended to permit a sweeping withdrawal of the crumbling German left flank.

R. C. A. F. Awards Announced

OTTAWA, Aug. 7 — (CP) — Air Force Headquarters announced tonight the award of Distinguished Flying Crosses to four R. C. A. F. pilots serving overseas who together have destroyed a total of 22 enemy aircraft while giving air protection to the invasion forces. One of these decorations has since been awarded killed.

Red Troops Capture Rich Oil Wells

LONDON, Aug. 7 — (AP) — Russian troops captured the rich oil wells of Boryslaw and the communications stronghold of Sambor in the Carpathian Mountains today, gaining secure grips on five routes leading into nearby Czechoslovakia, while other Soviet forces captured 60 localities beyond the enemy's broken Vistula River defenses in a drive aimed directly at German Silesia.

Quebec Labor Minister Defies Prices Board

QUEBEC, Aug. 7 — (CP) — Provincial Labor Minister Wilfrid Hamel announced tonight he had told Quebec tax drivers to start charging a 30-cent starting rate, refusal of which by the Prices Board has caused a week-long strike on the part of 300 taxi operators.

German Threw In 4 Armored Divisions

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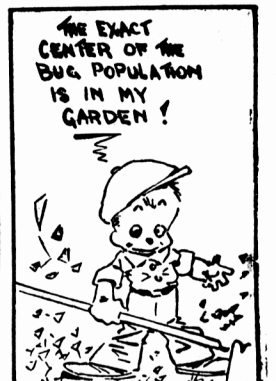
