Don Metz Scores In Overtime To Give Maple Leafs A 4-3 Victory

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—(CP)—Toronto's Maple Leafs, bidding to pull out of their first place in the National Hockey League, earned a 4-3 overtime victory over Montreal Canadiens here tonight after Canadiens had twice battled from behind to tie the count.

A crowd of 10,302 watched Don Metz score half-way through the extra session for a tally that assured Toronto of at least a share of the top berth with the Wings, while playing the Bruins at Boston. The loss dropped Canadiens into sixth place.

The overtime was forced when a tally by rookie Johnny Quilty late in the third period, of 3-3, a brilliant uphill battle by the Canadiens earlier had come from behind on a pair of goals by Earl Cooper to tie the count at 2-2. Goalie Dr. Dill's net sent the Leafs into a lead that Quilty overcame.

The Leafs went into an early lead in the first period when Nick Metz set up centre Syl Apps for a goal at 16:33 while defenceman Jack Portland of Montreal was

Free-for-all Staged As Black Hawks Beat New York Rangers 3-2

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Chicago's Black Hawks defeated New York Rangers 3-2 in a National Hockey League game tonight that saw the worst free-for-all fight since the famed Ranger-Boston Dumbbrook in the Stanley Cup series of 1939.

Five major penalties, two of them to the Cooper, the Hawk defenceman, were imposed by Referee Bill Stewart. The quarrel started in a first-period flare-up when Cooper flung Phil Watson with a blow to the head with his stick after Watson had elbowed him. Cooper got his first major for that, while Watson drew a minor.

The second period had barely got under way when Art Coulter scored on a long shot, tying the score at 1-1 after Cully Dahlstrom had netted the first goal for the Hawks. Coulter's goal was the signal for a big fight. Cooper and Watson came together, fists swinging and Phil Watson and Coulter quickly joined in. All four drew majors. The other players who got into the brawl, particularly Bryan Hestall, Murray Patrick and Dahlstrom, escaped without banishment.

Wings Drop From Lead In Tying Boston Bruins

BOSTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Detroit Red Wings, defeated in six starts, dropped out of a first place National Hockey League deadlock with Toronto tonight as Boston's crippled Bruins held them to a 1-1 overtime tie before 11,000 at the Boston Garden.

The Bruins have escaped defeat for six games but their last four contests have won up in tie games. They are being pushed New York Americans and Rangers and Chicago Black Hawks.

Waging their fourth clash of the campaign with the Bruins, who had a victory and two ties to their credit when tonight's game began, the Red Wings rapped in the first goal during the 16th minute of play. It was scored by Carl Liscombe on a rebound from Art Herchenratter.
