ENDORISING EACH OTHER.

The Patriot last evening meddled with strife that belonged not to it in a very unguarded and unwarrantable fashion. It most untruthfully charged this journal with having made "a personal attack" upon the Mayor. This is the direct opposite of the truth. On the contrary the Mayor made an attack upon THE GUARDIAN, upon its editor and reporter to which we did not retort in kind because we do not choose to lower the standard of decent discussion.

We are quite willing for the Patriot to whitewash the Mayor as it chooses, but no application of the brush can alter the facts. These facts, so far as the public are concerned, are that the Mayor, refusing to dismiss a twice convicted rumseller from the chairmanship of the Police Committee, has chosen to give the convicted person a certificate of character as the best Councillor we have. When the Mayor thus becomes endorser for McDonald he does not lift the latter up. He cannot make the illegal rum trade look decent in the eyes of self-respecting citizens. But he can if he chooses descend from his pedestal and drag the misplaced honours of the mayoralty with him to the level occupied by his "best Councillor."

The Mayor's attack upon this journal was wholly gratuitous and uncalled-for. This journal had always treated him with kindness and courtesy. We did indeed, in respectful language call upon him to dismiss the Chairman of the Police Committee when that individual had been convicted and fined in the Police Court. In doing this we hoped that the Mayor had the will and courage to do his clear duty in the premises, and we were lending him our support to that end. When he delayed action we inquired publicly whether he would do his duty. No answer being given and no action taken, a representative of THE GUARDIAN was sent to call upon him. There was not in all this anything from which a public official of much higher grade than the Mayor could reasonably take offence. For this THE GUARDIAN was repaid with insulting epithets.

The Patriot's certificate of character to the Mayor makes the circle almost complete. It only remains for the Best Councillor to give his endorsement to the Patriot. We doubt whether he will give it, even on the famous "stairway."

There is only too much reason to believe that the Best Councillor thinks himself possessed of a pull sufficient to make both the Mayor and the Patriot dance to his piping. And the public are pretty generally of the same way of thinking.

It appears that there is to be no change at all for the present in the coronation oath. This will not matter very much for the present reign as the King at the opening of his first parliament took practically the same form of oath that is objected to. Lord Salisbury has made the statement, which we have not yet seen contradicted that the Roman Catholics generally are not anxious to have the offensive words withdrawn unless the declaration which secures the Protestant succession is also struck out. Lord Salisbury states that his Government have not and never had any intention to make any change as to the succession being limited to Princes of Protestant faith.
