BILLY SUNDAY TO VISIT FRONT

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Billy Sunday announced today that at the completion of the war talk tour in July he would go to France to visit the American expeditionary force. He told newspaper reporters he had been invited to France by Gen. Joffre and that he intended to go.

"I know large numbers of the men now in France with Gen. Pershing, for I have been in their homes." "And I feel moreover, that I now have a personal acquaintance with half of Pershing's men, because I have talked with them in the cantonments before they were sent over."

The evangelist rounded up his announcement about going to France thus: "I want to see the great international game that is being played on the western front of France, which is now in the last half of the ninth inning. The bases are full. The Kaiser is in the box. Uncle Sam is at the bat, and it's up to him to put the ball over the fence and send the Allies across the home plate with the winning run."

2,000 Hear Sermon

At noon "Billy" visited the Marble Collegiate Church at Twenty-ninth street and Fifth avenue. Following a solo by "Rody," who sang, "I Walk With the King," he delivered a sermon to almost 2,000 persons in which he attacked religious theorists who preach "liberal and modern religions," many of them, he said, of German origin.

He was in fine fit and spoke with all his old-time fire and enthusiasm as he "handed it hard" to professional and business men who demand "liberal religion."

"Ameh" said some one in the congregation. "Billy" nodded. "Bet your life," he said, "and I'll make you hotter louder than that."

Liberalism in marriage, he said, meant that a man might establish a harem in his home. Liberalism in love meant a libertine. "Imagine a 'liberal' police force, or a 'liberal' fire department—Good night!"

My dear friend Margaret: Just a line in answer to your most welcome and cheerful letter just received and glad to hear that you were all well at the time of writing. I am also well. The weather here is quite fine now a little frost at night and cold wind in the day, but it is better than rain. The people here are busy ploughing and they will soon be sowing the seed as they harvest here in June. We had no snow here yet and spring starts in January. I had a letter from sister Mary yesterday, she said that Charlie's hand was getting better. I wonder if Chester escaped in Halifax. I hope he is all right. Well dear Margaret I am glad that Laurier was defeated. Over here we nearly all voted for Union be-

cause we want to win the war. I feel sorry for the folks back in Canada who will not let their sons sign on for the trenches. There are just as fine men out here bearing it all, as them I do hope all the slackers will be called up. It would serve them just right, they are pro-Germans if ever there were any and if everyone was like them there would be a slim chance of the Allies winning the war. It is too bad they are so frightened to die, but isn't they are cowards at heart and the love for their God and country is not in them. Well Margaret I suppose you are still going to Prayer Meeting. Is George and Gave home this winter? Sister Mary told me that you are quite a big girl now and I am glad to hear that. I like the spearmint you sent me, as you say, 'We intend having a turkey dinner for Xmas here, and we are going to receive farloughs and I intend going to Scotland, but we are all longing for the time when we will go back to Canada. I am glad to hear that the prices for farm products are so good. Well Margaret I must come to a close for want of news, write soon and don't be frightened to tell me anything as the letters coming to France are not censored so far.
