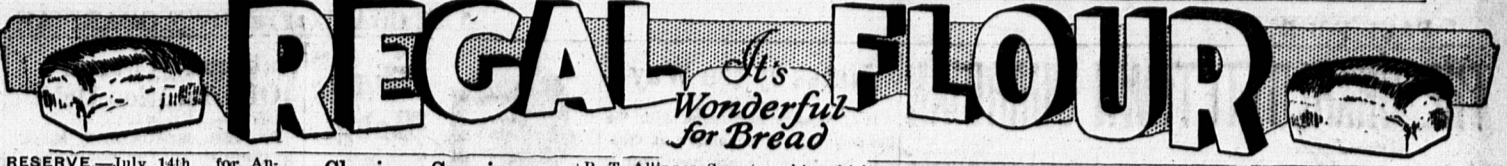

that in the home lies the cause of the major proportion of the moral downfall of little children, and that in striving to raise the moral standards of parents and home conditions and teaching by example and precept while in the plastic early years alone lies the hope of lessening this evil which is all too prevalent among our boys and in some cases our girls. He spoke of the excellent work of the Children's Aid Society along the lines of caring for and protecting the delinquent child. He explained and outlined the policy and objects of the society at related many heart rending experiences the members of the executive had met with since its incorporation in our city. Dr. McMillan also spoke of the case of the child handicapped by physical defects which react on the mental and moral forces inherent in the young life so as to render him an easy victim to degenerating influences.

He gave a splendid tribute to the Red Cross Society for the work they have done along the lines of remedying these physical defects in their children, their examinations, their visits, their nursing, their home and strive to impress on the audience the great necessity of having such defects remedied and the assured that the men and the hospitals were ready to assist in every way these who could not meet the financial outlay that needed operations would entail.

There were very many societies doing good work in our city in Charlotte-town all of which made for a better community to live in. Emigrants were being brought to our Province of the better kind. But of work done for and money spent on our greatest asset, the children of Prince Edward Island, the sum total was very small when we consider the sums of money spent on the improvement and development of fancy breeds of cattle, horses, swine, sheep, foxes, etc. At the recent clinics held at various centres of the Province by Tuberculosis specialists the percentage of children under 14 years of age examined showing the well defined disease state was 50 per cent. and over 14 years the percentage was also 50 per cent. This was indeed a disturbing showing.

There was much work to do. Dr. McMillan urged the ladies present to not only be awake to conditions in their own homes but to look with an interested eye on the homes of those motherless ones who are in need perhaps of a guiding hand or an interested and timely advice and encouragement.

A vote of thanks was moved by Mrs. M. Murphy who spoke of the interest in the C. W. L. manifested by the Hon. Dr. McMillan who spoke on the occasion of the first meeting held in our old quarters, saying she was most happy to welcome him in the new rooms which are so much more worthy the name of Rosary Hall. Mrs. Peter McDonald seconded the motion and Mrs. McIntyre presented the vote to the eminent speaker adding a few words to express her appreciation as much work along this line comes under the consideration and care of C. W. L. social workers.

The regular business of the subdivision was then taken up and very satisfying reports were read by Conventions of Education, Social Service, Juvenile Welfare and Sick visiting committees. The financial report of the Treasurer, Mrs. (Dr.) J. E. Blanchard showed the presentation of "An Arizona Cowboy" to have been an unqualified success, \$100 was voted as a donation to the Kelly's Cross Church building fund. Mrs. Frank Murray, Conventor of Entertainment was congratulated on the very excellent program provided for this meeting.

ALXANDER, Egypt, June 1.—Egypt is in the throes of a ministerial crisis the solution of which is likely to have far reaching effects on the future of the country, and its relations with the Dominion.

Premier Ahmed Zwiwar Pasha, who had been in office since 1924, has presented the resignation of his cabinet to King George and the King requested him to remain in office until a new cabinet is formed.

The next speaker was Rev. George Murray, of Trinidad, he referred to the many difficulties to be overcome, in this field of work. Yet he had seen good success, there were now 9424 members in the church, there were also found outside the church in the work being done in the schools and colleges among the young people. The meeting then took a sudden turn and social service matters were taken up, and Rev. Goodwin, of Saint John, spoke on the "Maritime Interpretation of the Home for Young Women in Moncton, giving a vivid account of present conditions, and that already that institution was occupied by some eight young women who have shown a great measure of their lives and character under the guidance of Miss Robison, Matron and her assistants.

Mr. Goodwin stated that Rev. M. O'Brien, of Yarmouth, N.S., had been appointed Field Secretary and Finance Agent, in place of Rev. Mr. Gardner who had returned to the pastorate. He trusted Mr. O'Brien would be kindly received throughout the Conference and encouraged in his work.

Rev. Mr. Barrett read the Social Service report, and for some time, Temperance had the right of way. This report in keeping with Mr. Goodwin's address read resolutions regarding the Truro and Moncton Homes for Young women, and asked for the support of the Conference.

Rev. H. R. Grant, Chief Inspector for Nova Scotia, Liquor Act, gave a strong address on the Temperance question, not sparing even the ministers when he expressed surprise that for a long time he had never heard of a sermon on Temperance from the pulpit, and never heard a prayer dealing directly with prayer for Divine help, and blessing on Temperance work.

He begged the Ministers and laymen of the Conference to make every effort to make the Prohibition Act more effective.

Rev. Thomas Marshall, made a brief address in which he crowded so much that he received loud applause when he sat down.

He referred to the promises of the present N. B. Government, when thirteen members, promised definitely to do all in their power to enforce the present Act, which had been designated the best Prohibition Act on the continent, if he were in the world.

He referred to his leaving the N. B. situation in Egypt

At a meeting held in Moncton a short time ago Misses Belding and O'Neill of Saint John were elected President and Secretary respectively.

Prince Edward Island is now being asked to name a Vice President and to encourage athletics among our fair sex; it is therefore with much pleasure we learn that Mr. S. F. Doyle, President of the M. P. B. of A. A. U. of C. is named as the Advisory Board for Prince Edward Island, and it is his wish that as many of our young ladies as possible attend the initial meeting of the Association next Monday evening at 8 o'clock in the Board of Trade rooms.

As it is already known the track and field championship meet takes place at Saint John, June 19th, and it is important that Prince Edward Island should be well represented at this meet. So girls get busy and do a little training in order to maintain our athletic standard at this the first women's championship meet.

It is understood that Mr. William Halphen, physical instructor at the League of the Cross has a class of girls under his expert instructions with an eye to preparing them for Saint John, June 19th. Let's hope that Bill will uncover a few "dark horses" among those under training, fit to hold their own with any competition at this meet.

Ball Player Has Skull Fractured

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—Ever Swanson, centre fielder for the San Francisco, Missions of the Pacific Coast League, suffered a fracture of the skull today, when he was hit by a pitched ball in the fifth inning of this morning's game with the San Francisco Seals. At the hospital he was reported in a serious condition. Marty Griffin was pitching for the Seals.

OTTAWA, June 1.—Col. T. Cantley, Conservative P. C. leader in the House yesterday afternoon the interview given by Robert Forke, Progressive leader, in Toronto, recently in which it was stated that Nova Scotia coal mines were not economically sound and that they produced poor quality of fuel.

Col. Cantley declared that the Government should get an "amendable honorable" from the Progressive leader for such a misstatement of facts.

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, interjected a question as to whether or not there was any sense of cabinet responsibility left in the Government.

OTTAWA, June 1.—The conference of provincial premiers, which has been postponed will be held here on June 7. The conference has been summoned by the premiers themselves and not under the auspices of the Federal government. Several questions are on the agenda of the meeting, including succession duties, the definition of fields of taxation and provincial subsidies.

In the matter of succession duties, a tentative agreement has, it is understood, been arrived at and now needs confirmation by the representatives of the provincial government. Its object is to eliminate certain overlapping of succession duties. Certain fields of taxation are still in dispute between provinces and the Dominion. This matter will be discussed at some length by the Premiers. The subject of provincial subsidies is of particular interest to Prince Edward Island where the government is asking for an increase of the annual grant from the Dominion.

Premier Stewart of Prince Edward Island, is already in the capital and it is expected that all of the provincial premiers will be present next week with the possible exception of Premier Brownlee of Alberta. A provincial election is pending in that province at the present time. Premier Rhodes of Nova Scotia was expected to arrive in Halifax on Tuesday from abroad and will, in all probability, attend the conference next Monday.

CAIRO, May 31.—Lord Lloyd, the new British High Commissioner in Egypt, yesterday had his first meeting with Zagloul Pasha, the Egyptian Nationalist leader. According to unofficial reports, the conversation did nothing to lessen the difficult situation, which has become more complicated recently by the decision of Zagloul to form a cabinet himself instead of permitting Adly Pasha, as had been previously arranged, to form it.

LONDON, June 1.—The customary Dominion Day dinner this year has been eliminated in favor of a combined reception, dance and concert, to be held in the Canadian building. Hon. P. C. Larkin, the Canadian High Commissioner in London, believes that attendance at a reception in the afternoon followed by dinner in the evening was in practice heretofore, involves too great a strain upon the guests. Moreover an evening function on the lines indicated to go into effect on July 1 of this year, is calculated to appeal to men and women, old and young alike.
