MONTREAL, Sept. 19—(CP)—Construction issues led the stock market to slightly higher ground today.

Canada Cement issues displayed marked improvement with the common in heavy buying, up 1 1-2 points at 6 1-2 and the preferred up 2 points at 90. Other constructions on the upside were Foundation and Hamilton Bridge with fractional additions.

National Breweries tacked on a point to 30 1-2 while Distillers-Seagrams climbed 1-4 to 24 3-4. Nickel featured a quiet metal section with a gain of 1-4 while St. Lawrence Paper preferred, added two points.

C.P.R. and Canadian Car, eased minor amounts but Dosco tacked on the minimum fraction. Oils tacked even. Montreal Power advanced 1-2 in utilities while a handful of others remained stationary. Imperial Tobacco and Massey-Harris displayed minor losses.

FINANCE

NEW YORK, Sept. 19—(AP)—The stock market encountered profit taking handicaps today.

Canadian stocks came back a little. Bell Telephone advanced 2 3-4 points to 105 3-4 while Distillers Seagram, Walkers and Brazilian Traction improved fractions. International Nickel and Ford were easy.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 44.1. Transfers totalled 469,460 against 479,380 the day before.

Steels were given a hand on the belief these companies may be the chief beneficiaries of the rearmament program.

Jones & Laughlin preferred was up 5 3-4 on a light turnover, and Republic Steel preferred gained 2 1-2. Lesser advances were held by U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, American Smelting, Sears Roebuck, Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, Pathe, Loft and U.S. Gypsum.

Lagging were Youngstown Sheet and Tube, U.S. Rubber, Santa Fe, N.Y. Central, Standard Oil of N.J. and Westinghouse.

GRAIN

CHICAGO, Sept. 19—(AP)—Buying of September wheat contracts, in which no trading will be permitted after Saturday, helped to strengthen wheat prices here today but gains were held to small fractions and were wiped out before the close.

Wheat closed unchanged to 5-8 cent lower. September closed 76 7-8 and December 77 3-8-1-2. Corn was 3-8 off to 1-8 up, September 61 3-8, December 55 3-4; oats 1-8-3-8 lower.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 19—(CP)—Export business estimated at more than 750,000 bushels was only partially reflected in pit trading on the Winnipeg grain exchange today as interest dropped sharply after yesterday's active trading at the new minimum levels of 70 cents a bushel for October wheat, 71 5-8 for December and 75 7-8 for May. Today's closing prices were at the minimums, after trades were posted in the October and December futures.

Buenos Aires wheat was 1 7-8 cents down at noon while Chicago was fractionally higher.

POINTS FOR THE POULTRY MAN

Feed the flock at regular hours and begin early in the morning. Have your roosters that you need? Cash in on them as soon as possible.

A good little crushed charcoal in the mash. It keeps hens sweet inside.

Don't bother long with sick or crippled fowls. Your time is too valuable, and they are not profitable.

It costs no more to feed a purebred flock than a scrubby mixed lot of fowls and the purebreds bring more pleasure and profit.

The prevention of rump and cold is worth much more than a lot of cures. Dry, clean quarters and no air drafts, will do the trick.

A good hen will lay 10 or 12 dozen eggs in a year, bringing profits above feeding cost, which amount to more than twice the cost price of the hen.

Heavy feeding without exercise in winter causes most of the digestive disorders, liver trouble, apoplexy, and other ailments, all of which cut down the egg yield and profits.

There are too many average hens in the country. When poultry keepers awaken to the idea of culling,

there will be more profit and fewer non-productive hens.

WAS KNOWN IN CANADA

LONDON, Sept. 19—(CP)—Gen. Charles J. Bruce Hay, 73 who served on a deputation to the Canadian militia in 1909-10, and distinguished himself in service in India and the near east, was killed during a recent bombing of a west end hotel, it was disclosed today.

A soldier with a long military record who was decorated many times, he died a civilian's death in the battle of London, where he had lived since his retirement in 1937.

His wife, Agatha, daughter of the late Rev. James Mangan, was killed at the same time.

From 1924 to the time of his retirement, he was Inspector General of the Army in Iraq, and head of the British military mission to that country.

PANAMANIAN TANKER SUNK

NEW YORK, Sept. 19—(AP)—The 3,939-ton Panamanian tanker Beme was sunk by an Italian submarine shortly after leaving Halifax, Pictou, on July 11, the New York Maritime Register said today. The Register had no report on survivors.
