TO PROBE POISONING OF FIFTEEN FOXES

KINGSTON, Aug. 20.—Superintendent Joseph Rogers of the provincial police force today began an investigation into the alleged poisoning of 15 young foxes of the Cataract Silver Fox Farm, and after hearing several witnesses adjourned the inquiry until the 25th. Dr. A. C. Neisch, professor of chemistry at Queen's, told of examining the stomachs of three of the foxes and finding phosphorus in considerable quantities. Rat poisons, he said, generally contained phosphorus, the evidence disclosed that detectives who had been working on the case discovered several days after the poisoning two boxes of rat poison at the home of Floyd Aylesworth one of the owners of the farm but no explanation was forthcoming as to how it got there. Two days before finding the poison the detectives had searched the house and the poison was not there at that time. The poisoned animals were valued at from \$300 to \$1,000 a pair.

Anglo-French Enmity

A L'anger Says Harden

"The most dangerous and regrettable fact in the world today is not German reparation, or even our own dreadful economic condition, but the growing enmity between England and France."

This was the startling statement made recently by a German. That German was Maximilian Harden, editor of Die Zukunft, whose life was attempted by a Monarchist secret organization a few days after the murder of Dr. Walter Rathenau, and who still, after a month lies in a hospital with his head, infected, swathed in bandages.

Although so weak he spoke in a low voice, pausing often and moving his head in weariness and pain. Herr Harden discussed for an hour German reaction, the international situation and hopes for the future.

"I see with horror that England and France move apart, while hatred between them grows and I observe with regret that the moderate elements in England help to widen the breach. They do not think far enough ahead, observing only that France pursues an inhuman policy, and forgetting to analyze the cause for the French attitude.


"Meanwhile, in Germany our people are so blind as to rejoice in the breach. They ought to see that if England distrusts and seeks to block every move France makes regarding Germany, and France distrusts every move England makes, we shall perish between the two stools. We need to face realities.

"The real crux of the problem is not France's temper, but France's need. I believe France is not animated so much by hatred towards us as by a great economic problem of mistrust and fear. Many things contribute towards her fear, for instance her economic precariousness whereby she is depending upon German reparations, also the constantly recurrent militarist and monarchist outbreak in Germany making France think Germany is resting on a shaky foundation.

"Our whole salvation depends upon overcoming that fear, for while I stand for all possible fulfillment of our obligations, I am convinced that reparations ultimately will be ineffectual for French reconstruction. It will depend upon an economic alliance between France and Germany whereby we can repair together the stupendous damage of the war. I am optimistic this will come about. I carry on a great correspondence with Frenchmen, and I do not believe that economic cooperation between France and Germany is an El Dorado.

"Like most people we would embrace the devil for our salvation and France is not that bad. In the past France and Germany always exchanged iron ore and coal to mutual benefit. The borders over which these materials passed have changed, but the ore and coal remain, and co-operation is still essential and will proceed when France no longer fears us.

"I do not doubt that German reactionaries understand this. Let France for her part understand that what the anti-German militarist fear above all is Entente help from Germany, the modification of Austria and Hungary, are not at all peace terms and a resumption ways upholding the liberal ele-

of German and French understandings against militaristic groups, perhaps, the best known fighter in Germany, dating his verbal wars from pre-war days, when the exposure of scandals involved him in a suit involving the Kaiser and landed him in jail.

"Previously an enthusiastic German, he reversed his hand during the war, becoming a so-called defeatist. His paper was several times suppressed. Reactionary secret organizations long planned to "get" Harden and almost succeeded after robbing him of a life-long friend through murdering Dr. Walter Rathenau. Dr. Rathenau, who attends him and who recently ordered on Lenin, reports Herr Harden out of danger and he will return to his Gruenwald villa in a few days.
