ARTILLERY BOYS VISIT DUBLIN

Delightful Account of How Some Island Boys Enjoyed a Short Furlough in Old Ireland Written by Corp. J.A. Hogan, Hope River

The following diary of a visit to Ireland by some of the 5th Siege Battery Boys was written by Corp. J. A. Hogan and sent to his mother, Mrs. W. H. Hogan, Hope River.

The members of this "sight seeing party" are Bombardier P. Murnaghan, carpenter by former trade, now serving his country, James McKenna; "Jack of all trades" now in khaki, P. D. McKenna, student; and J. P. McKenna, farmer; now soldiers of the King.

We left Witley Camp at 6 p. m. The whole Battery, with the exception of those who remained on guard, entrained for the majority for London, some for Scotland and this bunch for Ireland.

On approaching London we were bold enough to lift the blinds—they were supposed to be drawn. We were awfully surprised to see the search lights continually playing over the city.
