A LOG FOUND AT DEPTH OF 225 FEET

SPOKANE, Wash., July 26—Well-drillers working on the Bovenkamp ranch between Troy and Kendrick, Idaho, southeast of Spokane, encountered a log at a depth of 225 feet, when the heavy drill suddenly dropped three feet, probably its diameter. A half dozen pieces brought to the surface in buckets showed the wood was decayed until it could be crumbled between the fingers.
