SONG OVER ETHER BRINGS TRIUMPH

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, April 20—Announcement that Miss Regina Sens, a comparatively unknown coloratura soprano of New York, will make her American concert debut, reveals a true story of the magic of modern science that backs fanciful fiction off the boards. It is also expected she will shortly be heard in Canada.

Hailed in Europe as an artist of distinction Miss Sens after many years study in France and Italy returned to her home two years ago but it was not until recently that the beauty of her voice attracted the attention of Tito Schipa, Metropolitan Opera star.

The opportunity of a life-time and honor in her own country came to Miss Sens when her voice was carried 5,000 miles over the ether from New York to Rome, Italy.

Here is how Signor Schipa tells the story: "While in Rome recently, I returned home one night from a late party, turned on my radio, and heard a remarkable coloratura soprano singing from a New York station. I was so impressed by the outstanding clarity and flexibility of the voice that I made a note of the name and upon my return to New York, invited her to sing for me. I prophesy for her a phenomenal career."

The story of the ascent of Miss Sens up music's ladder of fame is similar in some respects to that of many of the world's great singers although she is probably the first to be literally thrust into the spotlight in America through the medium of scientific invention.

From her school-days Miss Sens cherished the ambition to win a high place in the musical world. Born in Vienna, she was brought to New York at the age of three and first studied singing under the late Dr. Daniel Sullivan and his wife, the former Brenda Stock of Dunedin, New Zealand.

Persistence and perseverance marked her career. Going to Europe she studied under Salvatore Castiglione in Milan, Italy, and Max D'Alone, well-known French composer in Paris. Engagements with the Monte Carlo Opera and in various continental opera houses followed the long and arduous training and she was hailed as a coloratura of high rank. Soloist with the Ostend Symphony Orchestra she was called upon to sing before many prominent people, including Gaston Doumergue, then president of France and the Canadian minister to France, Hon. Philippe Roy.

But her desire to win high honors in America remained unfulfilled. She returned to New York two years ago taking several radio engagements. Then came the "bolt from the blue"—the invitation to sing for the great Metropolitan lyric tenor.

Schipa will give Miss Sens her concert debut at one of his engagements during his present North American tour.

Mercy Flight Successful

Brought by airplane from Arbog, Man., 180 miles north of here last night, Miss E. Sigvaldson died in hospital from a ruptured appendix. Koenig J. J. Janssen, member of Winnipeg Falcons, Canadian hockey champions of the 1920 Olympic games, flew from Winnipeg in 45 minutes and made the return flight with Miss Sigvaldson aboard in 35 minutes. Immediate medical attention, however, failed to save her life.

Oil Tanker Docks In Montreal

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 19—The oil tanker Bullmouth from Curacao, Dutch West Indies, second ocean vessel to reach Montreal harbor this season—docked tonight. Navigation was opened on Monday with the arrival of the Marisa Thorden from Gdynia, Poland.

Several other ships are expected to dock tomorrow, among them the Duchess of York, the first passenger vessel. Fog in the lower St. Lawrence is believed responsible for the delay of several freighters and passenger ships now heading this way.

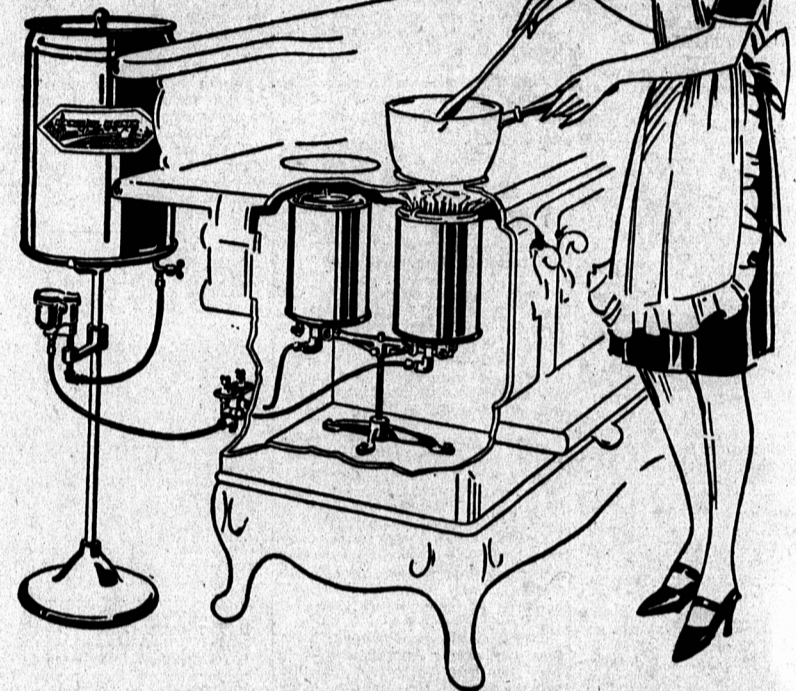

FORMER M. P. MURDERED

W. K. Baldwin Found Dead in Store.

By Guardian's Special Wire) BALDWIN'S MILLS, Que., April 19—A posse of provincial police and citizens of this district scoured the countryside today for a man believed in his early thirties who was seen hovering near the store of W. K. Baldwin, former Liberal M. P., for Stanstead, shortly before Mr. Baldwin died from a blow on the skull.

Baldwin's Mills, named after Mr. Baldwin's ancestor who came to the eastern townships of Quebec from Connecticut about 1800, is a small settlement nine miles from Coaticook.

Mr. Baldwin was found unconscious behind the counter of his store with a paper bag stuffed in his mouth last evening. A customer finding the store locked up went in search of Mr. Baldwin at the home of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Harold Baldwin, in company with two men the latter went to the store and had the front door forced open.

found unconscious behind his counter, a gag in his mouth and his arms and feet bound with rope. A white sheet had been thrown over him. The "M" had been rifled of a small amount.

Students May Face Court Action

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) FREDERICTON, N. B., April 19—The result of a "practical joke" by two Mount Allison University students, court action loomed tonight following announcement by deputy attorney-general R. P. Hartley of Fredericton, that the youths would be haled into police court at Moncton Saturday to face charges of "threat by written letter to burn a building," under section 516 of the Criminal Code.

The announcement was made following conferences between deputy attorney-general Hartley and Dr. George J. Trueman, president of Mount Allison at Sackville yesterday.

The students' proposal they leave the college was accepted by President Trueman when after investigation by University authorities the students revealed the threatening letter was intended as a schoolboy prank.

The student from Ottawa is still at Sackville under surveillance of University authorities while the Moncton lad, a freshman, is at home.

French Naval Conscripts Term Extended

By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, April 19—France moved tonight to hold naval conscripts under the colors for six months more than the regular two-year term, thus maintaining the full effective strength of the fleet for the "lean years" 1936 to 1940, occasioned by the decline in the birth rate during the war.

The decree will first be fully applied to men who finish their term of service at the end of April, 1936. All navy men finishing their term between July, 1935, and the following April will serve three extra months.

The decision, announced in the official Gazette, was made at last Tuesday's cabinet meeting, it was stated, and is in line with similar measures recently enforced in the army.

Four Women Help Man Soviet Ship

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 19—When the Russian freighter Kalman docked in Brooklyn today a young woman in a peaked cap, a blue jacket with brass buttons and a blue skirt climbed from the bridge and asked what time the baseball game started at the Stadium.

She was Miss Anna Tumanina, 23, third officer of the vessel. There are three other young women in the Kalman's crew. They are Tiberitohen Tamar, a machinist, and Maria Semanova and Lida Marchuk, stewards, each 16. Miss Tumanina, as third mate, is boss of 30 men. She must stand watch at sea, shoot the sun for the ship's position every noon, keep a log and find work for the crew.
