(Continued from page 1) What Premier Stewart Did.

Premier Stewart also put it in his platform in 1923 that he would press the claims of this province at Ottawa. He has had that in mind from the beginning. He has pressed those claims, and has brought home more than our legal share of the money granted in lieu of railway taxes.

All I have to say to that (continued) Mr. McDonald) is that the public men in this province are not paid a very high salary as compared with other provinces, though they devote all their time to their duties as Premier Stewart does; and the only satisfaction a man can receive for his assiduous work is the knowledge that he has done a duty to his province.

The Speaker went on to show that the same opposition existed while the Liberal Government was in power, yet they failed to grasp that opportunity. Now the Leader of the Opposition seeks to show that Mr. R. H. Jenkins and other Liberal members of the House of Commons helped in pressing our claims.

My hon. friend says, with regard to the \$125,000 increased subsidy, that the credit goes to Hon. MacKenzie King. That statement has been repudiated in the House, but perhaps it will bear repetition. Hon. Mr. King came to the Maritime Provinces and he was ignorant as to what Maritime rights were at that time.
