Britain Makes New Cuts To Save Grain

Standard bread loaf cut from 2 lbs. to 1 3/4 lbs. while same price is being retained.

RESULTS Saving of 12 1/2 percent of flour used in bread manufacture, provided the public does not buy more loaves. Reduction in price of potatoes has been made to encourage substitution.

CUTS 15 percent out in barley for brewing. RESULTS Saving of an estimated 148,000 tons of barley in a growing season.

CUTS Output of cooking reduced by 26 percent. Production of four confectionery and cakes cut by 25 percent, through reducing supplies of sugar and fats to bakers.

RESULTS Besides the saving in flour, the saving of fats and sugar will amount to about 40,000 tons a year.

CUTS Extraction rate of flour raised from 85 percent to 90 percent. (Before the war the rate was 73 percent.)

RESULTS Flour supply increased. Raising the extraction rate of flour means a reduction in milling offal, however, about 300,000 tons of animal feeding stuffs a year will be lost.

CUTS 200,000 tons of grain in stocks or enroute to Britain diverted to India, South Africa, certain colonial territories, U.N. R. A. and the British zone of Germany. (The diversion was made at the urgent request of the United States, and it is therefore to be assumed that they have undertaken the responsibility for arranging the replacement.)

RESULTS Immediate release of 200,000 tons of grain to needy areas.
