Demand for Labor in Manitoba.

SIR,—In THE GUARDIAN of the 18th September appears a communication signed D. H. D. remarkable chiefly for the misleading statements and inaccuracies with which it abounds. He begins by saying that the boys from the Island have had a hard time to get the work they expected to find so easily; that it is hard to get work, even at low wages; that the C. P. R. brought out 18,000 more men than they could find work for in the harvest fields and that some of them had to go to work on the railroad, others to the quarries, some to Rainy River, some to the gold mines and a number with back to Ontario. The whole trouble seems to have been occasioned by not attending to the proper distribution of the men on their arrival in Winnipeg. The majority of them went west on the C. P. R. main line to Brandon and other places until it got full of men, and quite a number of them had to come back this way where the found work immediately on their arrival at from \$40 to \$50 per month. The lowest wages around here is \$40 a month and there is plenty work for all. In Morden they require from 200 to \$40 men just now to stack and thresh the grain but cannot get them and in Glenboro twelve miles from here, they are offering \$2 a day for threshing but cannot get enough men. It is somewhat strange, in view of these facts, that any one would have to work for \$15 a month when they could easily get from \$40 to \$50. He further says the farmers cannot afford to give such big wages as they are so hard pushed on account of the failure of the crop last year, but they are giving it just the same and can afford to do so. Again he says wheat is only turning out from 12 to 30 bushels to the acre. Well it is turning out from 25 to 35 bushels around here, the lowest being 20 bushels per acre. D. H. D. seems to think the farmers of Manitoba will have a hard time to meet their bills this fall but he need not worry about it as they were never in a more prosperous condition than they are this year. He advises the people of P. E. Island to stay where they are if they have good farms, but if they cannot get along, to come out here. I suppose he means by that if they are so poor that they cannot make a living on P. E. Island to come out here where they can do better. I know quite a few who came out to this country from P. E. Island some years ago, not because they could not make a living down there, as they are just the kind of people who would do well in any country, but because they wished to better their condition and now they are worth from ten to twenty thousand dollars. We all know there are some people who never succeed in any country, but anyone who is not afraid of hard work and who is determined to succeed, will make no mistake in coming to Manitoba. Lastly, he tells about the thunderstorms, hail storms and other bad storms we have in Manitoba, and about horses and cattle running against barb wire fences, cutting themselves and hail stones as big as hen's eggs and a lot of other desperate things with which the long suffering people of Manitoba are afflicted and then he stops, and I think it was time. Let me say right here that if any one does not like Manitoba, the best thing for him to do is to leave and go to some other country where the conditions are more favorable.

NOT TOO GENEROUS.

He is willing to advance money to pay the Duke's debts, but as a five-per cent loan, not as a gift.
