LAS VEGAS, Nev., May 21 (U.P.)—While Reno marriage licenses are soaring monthly to new heights, her smaller sister cities are also making rapid gains. The Clerk's office at Las Vegas has been issuing licenses at the rate of 100 per month, passing last year's totals by 35 per cent. As many licenses were issued during April, 1931, as during the entire year of 1928, officials say. The increase is attributed to the Arizona "gin marriage law."

The Markets

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., May 21—Butter and egg prices advanced while cheese and potato quotations were unchanged on the produce and dairy market here today.

No. 1 finest pasteurized fresh butter in carlots, gained a half a cent at 21 1-4 to 21 1-2 cents a pound. To retailers solids and prints were unchanged at 22 and 24 cents a pound. Receipts were 112 boxes. Fresh Ontario and prairie eggs, in carlots, were a half a cent higher, extras being quoted at 21 1-2 to 22 1-2 cents, firsts at 18 1-2 cents and seconds at 15 1-2 cents a dozen. Carlot prices of British Columbia fresh extras and firsts were also up half a cent at 22 1-2 to 23 1-2 cents and 19 1-2 to 20 1-2 cents a dozen. Quotations to retailers were unchanged. Receipts were 2,501 cases. Ontario cheese was quoted at 9 3-4 to 10 cents and Quebec cheese at 9 1-4 cents a pound. Receipts were 1,623 boxes. New Brunswick green mountain potatoes in carlots were quoted at 60 to 70 cents per eighty pound bag or 90 pounds bulk and to retailers 70 to 80 cents per 80 pound bag. Prince Edward Island whites were quoted to retailers at 80 to 85 cents per 90 pounds and Quebec whites to retailers per 90 pounds sixty to seventy cents.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 21—Egg markets continue to show a firm trend and some further fractional price advances are reported today. Receipts continue to fall off in most producing sections. TORONTO—This egg market is about steady today with a smaller percentage of extras showing in current receipts. The prices at which graded shipments from Ontario country points are selling to wholesalers are unchanged at extras 30 to 21, firsts 18, seconds 15, delivered. HALIFAX—Receipts of local eggs on this market show a slight decrease and prices are firming. Dealers are quoting producers and country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 14 to 15, firsts 12 to 13, seconds 10 to 11, delivered. Wholesale prices to retail stores are extras 24 to 25, firsts 18 to 20, seconds 14 to 15. 4,733 cases for the corresponding day last year. The market is firmer and again higher. Sales of eggs on spot have been made to wholesalers at extras 22, firsts 18, seconds 15. Carlots from the prairies are offering at extras 21 1-2, firsts 18 1-2, seconds 15 1-4, delivered.
