L. Carr, spent the full day in discussing and outlining for the guidance of the various Committees, a suitable programme of work for 1934.

President Carr was appointed delegate to the Canadian National Exhibition and Messrs. C. T. Kouch, F. W. Lee and T. O. Dolson, delegates to the Royal Winter Fair, Vere S. Oliver of Rockingham, N. H., was appointed Judge at the Royal with J. F. Eves of Chicago, as Reserve; the latter to take the place of the former if Mr. Oliver officiates as Judge of Holsteins at the Waterloo Dairy Congress, which precedes the Royal.

Durs Innes, of Woodstock, was the choice of the board for the appointment as Judge of Holsteins at the C. N. E. with F. H. Hubbs as reserve. In the case of both the Royal and the C. N. 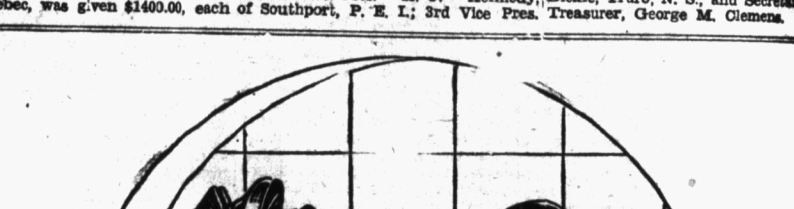
