## COLLEGE AMALGAMATION DISCUSSED BY DR. TROTTER

Principal of Acadia University—Reasons Why the Baptist College Cannot at Once Decide and May Probably Hold Aloof—The Convention Must be Consulted.

Dear Sir:—A despatch appeared in the public prints a few days ago purporting to represent certain remarks of mine on the subject of University Consolidation, made in the hearing of a newspaper correspondent in a distant town. On account of its brevity and fragmentariness, the despatch necessarily gave but a very imperfect impression of anything I said in the interview, and as one would wish to be rightly understood on so important a subject, I shall be obliged if you will give space to a few paragraphs from my own pen. Without attempting to discuss the consolidation question in the large, permit me simply to make clear the points alluded to in the despatch.

One of my statements was that so far as Acadia is concerned any authoritative deliverance can be made only by the Maritime Baptist Convention, which meets this year during the month of August at Yarmouth. The Board of Governors of Acadia, unlike the Boards of some of the other colleges, is not an independent self-perpetuating body with final authority. Its members are appointed directly by the Maritime Baptist Convention, which includes the Baptist churches of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, and exercises control over the missionary and educational work of the Maritime Baptists. The yearly meeting of the convention is chiefly for the purpose of receiving and considering the missionary and educational reports. The Board, therefore, is not competent to open a question of a radical change of policy, such as the consolidation scheme contemplates, without first referring the matter to the convention, and receiving the mandate of the superior body.

Speaking in an informal and cursory way I further mentioned the fact that the example of some of the friends of King's in seeking amalgamation with Dalhousie did not of itself supply any very cogent reason why the friends of Acadia should do the same. It has been quite too largely assumed in the writings of some of the advocates of amalgamation that all colleges are in extremities which themselves make amalgamation desirable. If any college is experiencing temporary depression we sincerely regret it. In the case of Acadia the facts will bear stating with entire candour. They are by no means of a discouraging sort. The institution has steadily increased its professoriate, and has now eleven professors. The average annual attendance of students in the arts course for the last five years has been one hundred and forty, which approximates to the number which the institution can efficiently handle with its present accommodations, and its methods of teaching. In matters of finance, larger resources are urgently needed, and must be forthcoming, if the future is to be met with growing efficiency, and with a progressive adjustment of the work to the demands of the times. But the history of recent years has created a hopeful spirit at this point. In the last year of Dr. Sawyer's presidency, a bequest was left to the educational work at Wolfville of \$100,000.00. Smaller bequests have come in since. Within the last five years a popular appeal to the constituency of college has resulted in the raising of \$75,000.00 more. Within three months from now the last dollar of this amount will have been collected, and the way will be open for further aggressive proposals.

The response to this last appeal was spontaneous and hearty in the highest degree. Moreover, it has not exhausted, but enlarged the spirit of beneficence and devotion towards the college. Instead, therefore, of depression, there is, as I have said, a spirit of large, and well grounded hopefulness and confidence that the future can be met with greater and greater efficiency. Another remark alluded to in the despatch ought to be made clear, the remark respecting the University of New Brunswick. If the reports in the press are reliable, Mount Allison University has already declined to confer. The University of New Brunswick, on the other hand, has appointed a committee to meet with the joint committee of King's and Dalhousie, but with the preliminary intimation, according to the Morning Chronicle, that its governing body has no hope that any scheme can be acceptable to her. Her relations to the Provincial treasury and school system are such that legislative union of the provinces seems to be the only way to ensure college union. With the declaration that Mount Allison will continue its work as an independent institution, and the moral certainty that U. N. B. will do the same, the amalgamation scheme is reduced to a proposal to amalgamate the Nova Scotian college, which so far as Acadia is concerned makes the proposal clearly impracticable. Acadia is not a Nova Scotian college. It is owned and controlled by the Baptist convention or the three Maritime Provinces. All the provinces are represented

upon its Board. Funds for its support are gathered from the churches of the three provinces. The Baptists of New Brunswick have as important a stake in it as the Baptists of Nova Scotia. Were the Baptists disposed to amalgamate, it is but reasonable to suppose that the New Brunswick section of the constituency would prefer to merge their influence, and their share of Acadia's endowments, not in a new institution in the Nova Scotia capital, but in their own provincial University. Apart altogether, therefore, from any consideration of the abstract merits of the question of consolidation, it would seem that the recent course of events has already put the matter for Acadia outside the realm of practical questions.

One further point needs a word of elucidation. I stated to the author of the despatch that if the question of consolidation were still a practical one, there would be many difficulties in the way of Acadia's entering the union, the most important and fundamental of which would be that it would involve an abandonment of that Christian ideal of college education for which Acadia has stood throughout her entire history. Other ideals there are, of course, which are wholly worthy, and which in certain circumstances may be the only ones practicable. The state university, for example, sometimes becomes a necessity. Such an institution, being supported and controlled by the state is, of course, incompetent to deal with things spiritual, and must confine itself to the sphere of secular education. Another type of college is the independent college which, while free from state connection, adopts from various motives the secular ideal. Incidentally, upon the staff of either of these colleges there might be from time to time men of high Christian character the organization, however, would give no guarantee at this point. Permission also might be granted to the students of such institutions to unite together for Christian culture and service. A third type is the denominational college which together with secular education seeks to promote the demonstrational tenets of some Christian body. Acadia represents a fourth type. It has no state connection, but depends for its support upon the voluntary principle. While embracing in its curriculum all the studies of the secular college, which may be handled with the utmost freedom, it provides that the work shall be done under distinctly Christian auspices. It is not denominational in the sense of inculcating denominational tenets, but only in the sense of being controlled by a Christian denomination. Its founders and supporters proceed upon the fundamental assumptions common to all evangelical Christians, and believe that the broadest and highest education will take cognizance of these. Regarding Jesus Christ as the Light of the World, they believe that that is the truest system of education which in its study of man, of nature, of God, of the present and the future, has its windows wide open to the light in such a college the Christian element is not a permitted and incidental, but a characteristic and vital element. The student is regarded as a being moral and spiritual as well as intellectual, whose spiritual attitudes and relationships constitute the determinative factor in his life for time and eternity. It is believed that the spiritual will no more take care of itself than will the intellectual. The Christian college, therefore, seeks to organize and conduct a type of education which shall recognize and appeal to the student in his wholeness, and shall aim to correlate the manifold elements of his nature, and whatever increase of learning and power may come to him, in accordance with Christian ideals. In harmony with this Christian conception the governors of such a college are elected, its professors are chosen, its curriculum is framed, its daily life is organized and directed, and its atmosphere determined. It is not surprising that all men do not feel alike as to the importance of this ideal, but it unquestionably embodies the fundamental obstruction in the case of the Baptists, when asked to let Acadia go, and to merge their work in that of a general institution such as would be possible in an amalgamated scheme. The views here expressed do not represent a fad, but the profound convictions of multitudes of Christian men; and only when they are intelligently reckoned with has anyone a grasp of the actual situation. It may be a heavy undertaking to work out efficiently the Christian ideal, through all the changing conditions that may arise, but such value is attached to it by large numbers that they would think no effort or sacrifice too great in its behalf.
