

Favorites Come Through In Ontario Tennis

OTTAWA, July 19 — (CP) — Running off as many as many as 26 matches at a time, officials of the Ontario tennis championships weeded down an unwieldy field of 150 contestants in first-round play today. Favorites moved ahead easily and there were no upsets of seeded players.

Clear favorites for the provincial titles had an easy day as the matches continued through warm, clear weather at the Rideau Lawn Tennis Club.

Don McDiarmid of Ottawa, former Canadian champion, was given a long edge on the men's senior competition. He drew a first-round bye and defeated William McRae of Ottawa 6-0, 6-0 to move into the third round Wednesday.

Meanwhile, the senior women's top-seeded player, Pat Macken of Montreal, downed the top-seeded junior, Pat Lowe of Ottawa, in senior competition. She won 6-3, 1-4 over the Ottawa junior, who was runner-up in the Dominion championships last year and is highly favored to win the junior crown.

Vancouver's 18-year-old Lorne Main made an easy 6-0, 6-0 win over Allan Livingston of Ottawa in his first set. Also seeded third in the men's senior bracket.

A minor upset was scored against slim Bruce Logie of Toronto, last year's Ontario junior champ, who bowed out to young Andre D'Aoust of Ottawa.

Rounding out the list of seeded senior men is Jack Hopkins of Toronto, seeded second to McDiarmid; Main, third; Don Hawley of Newark, N.J., fourth and Lucien Lecomte of Ottawa, fifth. All won their first-round matches. Seeded after Pat Macken among the senior women are Mrs. Vera Lewis of Ottawa; Louis Brown, Toronto; Sonia Swift, Ottawa; Pauline Laquerre, Montreal; Mrs. Ruby Fisher, Toronto; Pauline Roberson, Montreal and Anne Freedhoff, Toronto.

Detroit Cutter Wins Mackinac Island Race

MACKINAC ISLAND, Mich., July 19 — (AP) — The speedy Detroit cutter Blitzen' held top honors today as the last of nearly 50 yachts struggled in to end the 24th annual Port Huron to Mackinac Island race. The Blitzen's corrected time for the 242-mile Lake Huron course was 31 hours, 11 minutes and 40 seconds to give her the title in cruising class A. Dave Sloss's Kathmar won the cruising class B with a corrected time of 34:34:41, and The Gale, owned by Harry Nye of Chicago, won in the racing class at 32:37:05. Winds up to 35 miles an hour made it the second fastest race on record but knocked a number of ships out of the competition. Wendell Anderson's Escapade set a class A record by running the course in 31:33:45. She was first over the finish line but had no handicap and was nosed out on corrected time by the Blitzen, with a handicap of better than two hours.
